RAY OF HOPE INSTITUTE MEETING The regular meeting of the Ray of Hope Women's Institute was held in the Institute room at Murray River on May 12th. Ten members were present. Reports of Sick School Committees were given and it was announced that a donation of \$10.00 was received from Mrs. Dewar of Oshawa, Ontario, a former member, to send cigarettes to Murray River boys overseas. The sum of \$8.00, proceeds from tickets sold on quilt, was sent to the Kinsmen's Milk for Britain Fund. It was decided to repair and concrete sidewalks in the village.

The following Red Cross work was completed and handed in: 1 khaki sleeveless sweater; 1 air force sleeveless sweater; 4 girls' windbreakers (age 6); 3 pr. air force socks; 3 pr. white socks; 4 pr. seaman's socks (26 inch); 4 pr. boys' pyjamas; 2 jacket suits; 2 pr. navy gloves. The following work was donated: 2 large quilts (R. C. work); 1 quilt (Mrs. McDonald and Misses Kate and Belle McPherson); 1 pr. grey socks (Mrs. C. H. Horton); 13 pr. children's socks; 2 bonnets; 1 pr. men's socks (Mrs. Wheatley).

BUILT FOR USE WITHOUT FRILLS No more tricky gadgets, fancy trim or colour; no more table tops coveralls or elegance of design in the kitchen ranges coming up. Designs for war-time model stoves and ranges, which manufacturers are now being asked to submit to the controller of supplies for approval, must be strictly utilitarian in the cause of metal conservation. Number of models and finishes are cut to a minimum in all classes. One finish only is permitted, except in a very few instances. Legs will replace closed-in bases where possible. If steel bases are used, the controller, only the minimum of metal necessary for structural support of the stove is allowed. All luxury models with such gadgets as minute-minders, mirrors and like are cut, and interchangeable fuel fittings limited. Low oven gas and electric stoves and ranges are shorn of upper shelves and warming closets, and are to be made without backs above the stove proper, with the exception of one or two gas-burning models permitted an eight-inch backboard. In coal and wood-burning ranges manufacturers may make one model in steel or cast metal with upper heating closet and one with shelf. Reservoirs are permitted, but must not be used at side or back.

In 1911 Mr. Benjamin Rogers the founder died and was succeeded by Mr. George J. Rogers.

MR. BENJ. ROGERS, President.—In 1929 Mr. Benjamin Rogers the present President took over the stock of his brother the late George Rogers and is now President and General Manager.

MR. GEORGE J. ROGERS — Mr. George J. Rogers was President from 1911 until his death 1929.

W. T. ROGERS, Director—The third generation of the Rogers' Family associated with the firm since 1929.

P. J. ROSSITER, Vice-President—P. J. Rossiter joined The Rogers Hardware Company in 1921 as Travelling Salesman, continuing a salesman until 1937 when appointed Vice-President and Assistant Manager.

F. A. VANIDERSTINE, Sec'y-Treasurer—F. A. VanInderstine joined the firm in 1927.

War—25 Years Ago Today

MAY 17, 1917—British Air Corps captured the first of the United States destroyers used in operations in the North Sea. British completed capture of Bilibio in Arica-Vinca sector where fighting had been going on since May 3.
