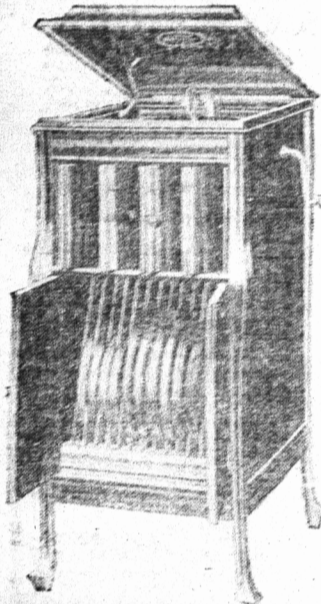

WANT PEACE WITHOUT HATE

LONDON, May 4--The attempt to start a movement to keep up antagonism to Germany after the end of the war has failed to make any headway, or even to interest the British people.

"We, the undersigned, agree together to use our best efforts to combat German trade and influence in Great Britain, and undertake to employ no German labor in our offices or homes nor handle, knowingly, anything which is of German make or origin.

ENGLISH BLOCQUE OF GERMANY FIRM AS EVER, FRENCH MINISTER

BORDEAUX, May 4--The English blockade remains as firm as ever and it would be a dangerous experience to attempt to force it," says Victor Agagnier, the French minister of Marine.

"We know that light cruisers of 20 knots belonging to the enemy have been forced one point and arrived off the Belgian coast, but these vessels, assuming that they were able to reach the vicinity of Dunkirk, could not bombard that city effectively, as the calibre of guns of the light vessels is only 4.5. The shells used on Dunkirk were all a large calibre."

WILL INQUIRE INTO SINKING OF THE GULLFIGHT.

WASHINGTON, May 4--Pending an official investigation of the circumstances of the wrecking of the American steamer Gullflight in the English Channel, the United States Government will defer diplomatic representations as well as any pronouncement of policy.

Two messages were received today from American Consul Stephens at Plymouth, England, reporting that the Gullflight was torpedoed off the Scilly Islands Saturday and that her Captain died of heart failure and that two members of her crew were drowned.

Secretary Bryan called attention to the fact that the source of his authority was not given by Consul Stephens, and that the message read as if he were reporting on information he had heard rather than facts officially learned. Mr. Bryan said he would ask for a thorough and complete report from the American Consul and would direct Ambassador Gerard at Berlin to make similar inquiry of the German Government for such facts as it might have on the subject.

The Secretary announced that he did not wish to make any predictions as to the course of the American government's policy until all the facts were in its possession. Officials were careful not to take for granted the truth of reports that a German torpedo struck the Gullflight. Until there is definite proof no statement bearing on the delicate point of the responsibility was deemed expedient.

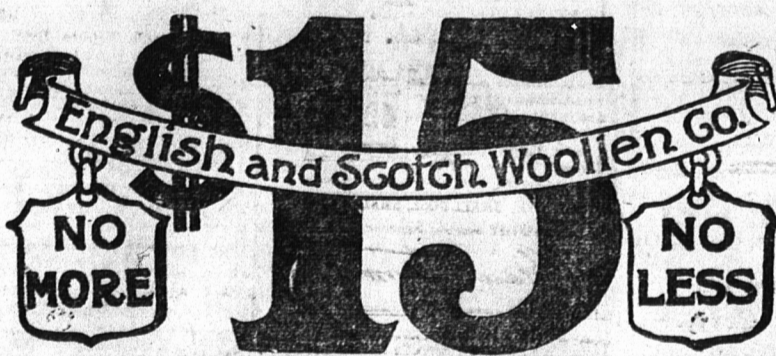
