Violations Of Price Regulations

Increasing the prices of haircuts resulted in a fine of \$400 being imposed on the operator of a barber shop in Whitehorse, Yukon Territory the weekly enforcement summary of Wartime Prices and Trade Board for the week ending August 20 reveals. Correspondingly severe penalties were meted out to persons across Canada who violated regulations of the Board.

Three Prince Edward Islanders were in the 66 prosecutions for violations of the Price Board orders and the 32 who acted contrary to the orders of the Oil, Rubber and Transit Controls.

Selling men's work trousers above maximum prices cost a Toronto clothing manufacturing company \$400, wholesaling men's trousers at excessive prices in a \$150 fine on a Montreal firm and charging unlawfully high prices for fuelwood brought a \$500 penalty to a Vancouver retailer as the Courts clamp-ed down on those who violated price regulations.

Goods and services found to have been sold at higher than legal maximum prices included potatoes, bananas, biscuits, fuelwood, restaurant meals, men's trousers, electric stoves, padlocks, washing machines and haircuts.

In the first prosecution for selling meat on Tuesday, a Toronto restaurant was fined \$100.

Canadians may argue about this and that, and different sections may have different ideas on many subjects, but Canadians are of one mind and heart in tribute to the unbounded courage and sheer physical do-or-die of the Chinese people. The very name of China is synonymous with gallantry.
