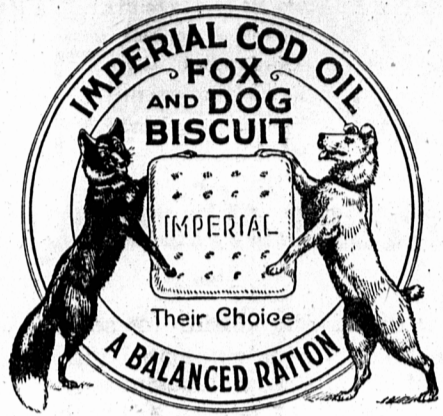

General Assembly Of The Presbyterian Church In Canada

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will convene in Knox-Crescent Church, Montreal, on the evening of June 2nd, at 8 p.m. The veteran Moderator, Mr. Epraim Scott, will preside at the opening of what promises to be another great assembly. Mr. Scott is the veteran of many fights. The man beyond all others who has done more to preserve the Church of his fathers than any other living churchman in this year of grace he has seen his reward. He has brought order out of seeming chaos; filled up the gaps in the files; strengthened the wavering line, and is still leading on to greater victories.

Who his successor in the moderator chair will be is not yet known; albeit three good men are in the running, viz: Mr. MacGillivray, of Guelph; Mr. Banks Nelson, of Hamilton, and Mr. Fraser, Principal of the now-saved Presbyterian College of Montreal, himself a native of Prince Edward Island. Upon whichever of those three the mantle of Mr. Scott may all, will find himself backed up by the General Assembly of loyalists such as has not been seen during the last twenty years.

The reports to come before the Assembly are all of the most encouraging nature. Nothing is more remarkable in the history of the Church than her most remarkable recovery since the disruption on June 10th, 1925, and the reports this year show her to be facing the future in that calm strength of faith, which has always characterized the Presbyterian Church in

Appointments of student missionaries to summer fields in the various Synods are as follows: Maritime Synod, 50; Montreal and Ottawa, 17; Toronto and Kingston, 20; Hamilton and London, 4; Manitoba, 2; Saskatchewan, 14; Alberta, 12; British Columbia, 9. Surely this is a grand record and puts heart into all.

The report in Foreign Missions will encourage all to go forward undauntedly, and promises great development in the coming year. Division of Mission Fields and

the allocation of part of these to the Presbyterian Church will occupy a large part of the time of the forthcoming Assembly. There are other reports all intensely interesting and full of great promise for the future. The progress of the church is thus shown to be truly marvellous, and every genuine, loyal Presbyterian heart will rejoice to be assured "That the Lord of Hosts is with us, and the God of Jacob is our refuge."
