MARK GUY PEARSE who visited Charlottetown last summer gave £700 to the West London Mission last year, and has promised to give as much this year. This is the result of his visit to Canada and the United States, and he has come again to reap another harvest.

THE demand for "Tunnel" stamps has been so great that the supply is exhausted. An effort is being made to secure several thousand more, and in the meantime all orders to hand will be held. THE necessary permission has been given the St. John South African veterans to place the tablet in memory of their comrades killed in South Africa in the Buxton Street Methodist church. The first plan was to have this unveiled on the 18th, but a later date will be named because of the absence at the Conference of Rev. Mr. Hamilton.

Mrs. JOHN S. FORBES nee Gertrude H. Campbell, with three young children left her father's residence in Montague, Thursday for Moosejaw, Assa. Her husband went west in September last and concluding to settle there has sent for his family. She is accompanied by her father-in-law, D. Forbes, Gladstone, Murray Harbor.

THE steamer Lunenburg arrived in port yesterday at noon from Plover, Nfld., on her first return trip to Charlottetown and Northern Cape Breton ports. The captain of the Lunenburg reports that he had a quantity of potatoes to land at Grand Bank, Nfld., at which place they are retailing at \$2.50 per barrel, or about one dollar per bushel. Bad weather prevented him from landing there however and he was obliged to bring them back to North Sydney, where they will be stored until the next trip of the Lunenburg or sold at a sacrifice.—Sydney Record 13th.

Hon. Mr. EMMERSON in a speech in the House of Commons several days ago said know fighting on the P. E. I. R. last winter cost \$65,299 while the earnings for the nine months fell off almost \$12,000. On the item for Murray Harbor, P. E. I., bridge, Letourgeur and Martin protested against its passage till the details of the expenditure they had asked for were brought down. MacLean of P. E. Island took strong ground on this question and demanded full information, the item involving over a million dollars. After some debate Mr. Emmerson allowed it to stand over.

A LARGE number of trees in the Maritime Provinces have been injured this year by the breaking of branches owing to the heavy snowfalls. This, it is true, is a serious matter, yet there is no reason why the trees should permanently suffer. The broken limbs should be sawed off neatly. It is quite probable that if any considerable portion of the head has been broken that a very large number of young suckers will be thrown out. In this case, these should be thinned and preference given to those that grow in the direction which will best repair the head. As the growth upon these suckers will be very rapid in all probability they should be cut back next spring at least one-half so as to secure a stocky growth and prevent the fruit spurs from forming too high in the tree. All wounds should be painted as soon as the exposed surface becomes dry and kept painted until they have completely grown over. If these precautions are taken no serious damage will be done to the trees except the loss of fruit for the first year or two.

FROM Charlottetown Rev. Dr. Henderson, Associate Secretary of Methodist Missions will go to Liverpool, N. S., to be present at the Nova Scotia Conference. At this gathering he will speak on missions, and will also deliver the ordination sermon. On leaving Liverpool he will go to Sydney and sail thence to Newfoundland. In Newfoundland he will preach before the Methodist Conference, give several addresses on missionary matters, and deliver the charge to the candidates for ordination. Speaking of him the last Wesleyan says—The Associate Secretary of Missions is wending his way toward the East, where wisdom and beauty dwell, that he may gather inspiration for the future, and give us glimpses of the great world movement of missions. Dr. Henderson comes to the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland with a name for eloquence, which whets the appetite and makes us long for more of the visions, glowing with golden phrases, and a culture born of deep study at the Cross. The East has many charms for the stranger in haunts made memorable by great names in the annals of literature, politics and military life, notable events wrought in the history of the Empire, and landscapes of beauty unsurpassed, and with these are linked the common courtesies of life, and hospitality of the people. A gracious welcome awaits Dr. Henderson wherever he goes during his visit, and we anticipate a deepened interest in missions, an increase in our funds, and an intelligent and sustained enthusiasm in the noble work of sending the Gospel to those who are in need.

There left Halifax last week for British Columbia, in charge of the Dominion Express Co., a carload of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island shell fish to be transplanted in the Pacific in the hope that they will thrive there and eventually give the Pacific coast a good supply of bivalves and crustacea. The shipment is upon order from the Dominion Government and the lobsters were supplied by Messrs Neville, the well known lobster packers. The fish were all specially selected, some coming from Sable and some from Peggewick, and by permission of the government a number of female spawners lobsters were included. There is great difficulty in getting them to the Pacific coast alive, as the trip takes seven days, while salt water will turn bad after a day and the fish will not live in fresh. Tanks are therefore out of the question, so the lobsters were carefully packed in damp sea weed in thirty cases and cool. Part of the shipment is in miniature refrigerating cases patented last year by John Neville. They are all of a special size, thought best by the Marine and Fisheries Department for transplanting, and Mr. Kempt, Fishery expert of that department, accompanies the shipment. Experiments in transplanting lobsters on the Pacific coast in the past have failed, most of the fish dying on the way, but John Neville, who has been experimenting on a small scale in landing live lobsters at Vancouver has been pretty successful and he feels sure this shipment will get through all right with good attention. The oysters were from P. E. Island and were specially selected stock. They went in the same car with the lobsters.—St. John Times.
