

Canadiens Hand 6-1 Defeat To Red Wings

(By The Associated Press)

DETROIT, Nov. 27.—Pouring in six goals in the last period—three of them by Billy Reay—Montreal broke a long victory drought on Detroit ice tonight by whipping the Red Wings 6-1 for its first National Hockey League triumph here in nine games since Feb. 4, 1945.

The Montreal runaway, humiliating the Red Wings before a full house of 13,201 customers, dropped Detroit into fourth place, and kept the Canadiens right alongside Toronto in a duel for the league lead.

Detroit scored first on Sid Abel's rebound shot after 5:12 minutes of play but Maurice Hecot (Rock) Richard needed only 34 seconds to bang in the tying goal and it was still 1-1 when the Canadiens uncorked their vicious scoring barrage in the third.

Reay, a former Red Wing, started his hat trick with the goal that broke the tie after only two minutes of play in the final period. Then it was Gravelle, on a pass from Reay, and Hecot (Rock) Blake swatted in his own rebound for the fourth Montreal goal in 13 minutes and Reay finished it off with his third goal, Gravelle again assisting, with a minute and a half left.

Four of the Canadiens boosted their scoring with at least two points apiece. Besides Reay's three goals, Gravelle had one score and two assists and both Richard and Blake had one goal and one assist.

Richard's two points left him just three points back of Detroit's Billy Taylor's league-leading 22 points in the scoring parade.

Canadiens Loan Pargeter To Buffalo Of A.H.L.

MONTREAL, Nov. 27.—(CP)—Manager Frank Selke of Montreal Canadiens announced today that George Pargeter, brought to the N.H.L. champions two weeks ago in a deal with Springfield of the American Hockey League, has been loaned to Buffalo of the A. H. L. for two weeks.

Selke said the Buffalo club appealed for help because of a second injury to defenseman Frankie Edolls and illness sniping at one or two others.

Edolls, who recently suffered a severe eye injury, was back in the game only two minutes Sunday night when he took the count again from a crack on the knee.

Pargeter will leave Detroit after tonight's Canadiens-Red Wings game and will report to the Buffalo Club at Pittsburgh where the Bisons play Saturday night. Canadiens still retain all rights to him.

Moncton Hawks And Saint John Battle To 4-All Tie

MONCTON, Nov. 27.—(CP)—Moncton Hawks tonight missed a chance to take over leadership in the Big Five Hockey League by a single point when they were held to a 4-4 overtime tie by the scrappy Saint John Beavers.

As a result of the tie and Halifax Crescents 8-4 defeat of the League-leading Bearcats, Hawks moved into a first place tie with the Caps and set the stage for a meeting between the two teams at Truro Saturday night.

Eddie Price broke the scoring ice near the end of the first session when he scored from Ab Colwell to give Beavers the lead.

Hawks overcame the deficit in the second frame when Trainor combined with Dowling and McManus to knot the count and Fritz Fraser barged through Beavers' defence to sink a relayed pass from Bell and Charlton.

Hawks made it 4-1 in their favor when McManus scored on a pass from Dowling and Trainor, but Beavers came back strong and again broke into the scoring before the period ended. Colwell set the play and Walter Kyle netted the disc.

Beavers outscored the Hawks two goals to one in the third period to gain an even break in the game. Joe O'Toole opened the scoring with assists from Butler and Myketyk. Hawks replied with a goal by Leadbetter assisted by Whitlock; nine minutes later Whalen converted Myketyk's pass for the tying goal.

Hawks will leave Friday on their first invasion of Nova Scotia this season. They are slated to meet Halifax United Services in the port city Friday night and Saturday night will take on the Bearcats at Truro.

DETROIT, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Eddie Prince, 135-pound Detroit Negro fighter, won the Michigan lightweight boxing title last night as he gained a split decision over champion Billy Eddy, 134 3-4, Flint, in a rough-and-tumble 10-round scrap.

A crowd of 2,016 fans at Arena Gardens paid a gross gate of \$4,066.60 to see the title change hands. There were no knockdowns.

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Capitols Trail New Yorkers By Half A Game

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—The sharpshooting Washington Capitols have once more narrowed the gap between them and the first-place New York Knickerbockers in the eastern division of the Basketball Association of America race to half a game.

The Caps defeated the Huskies 78-69 at Toronto last night while the Knicks were idle. Washington has a chance to forge ahead tonight by taking Chicago Slugs in camp. If the New Yorkers lose to St. Louis here tonight, the Caps will take a half-game lead.

Paced by big Johnny Mahnken who scored 21 points, the Caps never were in danger as they hung up their seventh victory in 10 starts. It was Toronto's eighth loss in 11 games. Ed Sadowski, Toronto playing coach, counted 23 points to take the lead in the league's individual scoring race with a total of 171 for nine games.

The late-starting Detroit Falcons made it three in a row last night by beating Cleveland Rebels 66-46 in a game that had no effect on the western division standings. Cleveland remains in third place, Detroit in fourth. St. Louis tops the division with eight victories in 10 starts.

Philadelphia Warriors dropped Providence out of a third-place tie in the eastern half by victimizing Boston Celtics 66-54. For the last-place Celtics, it was the 10th loss in 11 games.

Besides the St. Louis-New York and Chicago-Washington games tonight, Cleveland goes to Pittsburgh in the only other league encounter.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 26.—(AP)—William T. Tilden, 53, tennis pro and former United States champion, pleaded guilty today to a misdemeanor charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and applied for probation. Boston Bruins Defeat N. Y. Rangers 5-2

BOSTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—With veteran Bill Cowley and little Bobby Bauer each notching a pair of goals, Boston Bruins tonight gained a 5-2 National Hockey League victory over New York Rangers before a capacity 13,900 crowd at Boston Garden. It was the third victory in four starts against Rangers for the Bruins, who were held to a draw in the other contest.

The result vaulted Bruins into third place, two points behind the second-drawer Montreal Canadiens and a point ahead of Detroit's Red Wings.

Much to the surprise of the crowd, Coach Dit Clapper skated out with his forces and held down a defensive post as he made the first start in his 20th season as a Boston performer. And the popular veteran more than held his own, despite the fact he will hit the 40-year-old mark in February.

Rangers opened and closed the scoring. Church Russell collected the first goal after about six minutes of play and early in the finale, Alfie Pike whacked in a 20-footer as teammate Ab Demarco distracted goalie Frankie Brimsek at the crease.

Cowley, with Terry Reardon assisting, scored 30 seconds after the Russell and before the initial session closed. Woody Dumart gave the Bruins a 2-1 lead after being set up by Milt Schmidt.

During the eighth minute of the second period, Cowley countered again and Bauer's pair were the last Boston failures, made in the second period with Schmidt, and Dumart, his Kitchener, Ont., home townsmen, assisting.
