Chamberlain's War of Leaflets Brings Attacks on Home Front

BY MILTON BRONNER NEA Service Staff Correspondent LONDON, March — Here in wartime Britain where great pride is taken in the successful flights over Germany by the Royal Air Force—there are those in parliamentary and literary circles who are complaining because the planes do not drop bombs instead of leaflets. This has had no effect upon the Chamberlain government. The powers that be are well satisfied. If there is to be any bombing of cities, they are not going to start it. They are pleased when Hitler roars at one of his hand-picked audiences that he does not mind the British dropping their "idiotic pamphlets" around. GESTAPO FORBIDS READING LEAFLETS BRITAIN knows he does mind, or else he would not yell about it. She also knows he minds because his Gestapo hangs over the head of every German the threat of death or imprisonment for reading British leaflets, passing them along to a neighbor or discussing them. In making the flights, the young R. A. F. sky warriors, come familiar with air routes that lead to German cities. The aircraft advance averaged around a point. Steels did equally well. Rails felt the lifting urge and various industries benefited. Canadian issues moved forward almost in a body. Distillers Seagram, Dome and Lake Shore, McIntyre, Walkers, Ford and Imperial Oil were steady. Brazilian Tractron dipped a fraction. The Associated Press average of 60 selected stocks gained 2 of a point at 4:17. Transactions totalled \$44,150 shares compared with 65,419 yesterday. Leaders in the advance included Boeing Douglas, United Aircraft, Glenn — Martin, Curtis-Wright, North American Aviation, Bendix, Lockheed, Pan American Airways, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown, Harvester, New York Central, Great Northern preferred, Anaconda, American Smelting, Allied Chemical, Eastman and Western Union.
