Under Difficulties!



NOT without a few struggles did Samuel de Champlain succeed in landing his first cow in 1608. Those early pioneers, however, were accustomed to overcoming difficulties, and from that far away event dates the beginning of Canada's present day world important dairying industry.

Sixty years later there were nearly four thousand cattle in Eastern Canada, but not till 1701 was the first cow brought into what is now Ontario, another explorer—Cadillac—being associated with that event.

A herd of cattle driven North to the Red River Settlement in 1823 were the first to graze on the prairies of what is now Manitoba, while beyond the Rockies cattle were unknown until 1837.

With the establishment of the first cheese factory in 1864 and the first creamery a few years later, dairying assumed the status of a definite industry in Canada. It is a far cry from Champlain's little venture to the spacious meadows where Canada's vast herds graze today, for in 1920 the milk from those herds yielded products valued at no less than two hundred and seventy-six million dollars, of which about one sixth was exported.
