Enthusiasm At Annual Meeting Of Motor League

The first annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Motor League was held in the Board of Trade Rooms Wednesday night. The attendance, owing no doubt to the bad weather, was small, but those present were enthusiastic and the reports showed that the Association has been active and progressive and is determined to make still greater progress this year, and plans to double the present membership of 373.

The president, Mr. J. A. Webster, referred to organization activities and to the success of the road making system, 500 miles of main road have been "logged" and a 64 page Guide Book is being prepared also a detailed road map in sections which it is hoped to complete this year. Brief reference was made to the change in the rule of the road to take effect on May 1st. The government was commended for making the change and the suggestion made that all auto owners should exercise exceptional care when this rule comes into effect and "Drive to the Right." The President announced that it was proposed to have the road from Tormentine to Aulac, Sackville and Amherst, and place at Aulac a large sign bearing the words "Follow the Black Fox Trail to Prince Edward Island. A hand with a "Black Fox" emblem will be placed on the posts. On motion of Mr. E. H. Beer, seconded by Mr. Justice Arsenault the report was adopted.

Report of the Secretary-Treasurer for the year ending, April 15th showed the total receipts to be \$1,258.25 leaving a balance over disbursements of \$77.85.

Mr. Titus spoke of the painting of poles last year along 400 miles of road and outlined the work to be done in this line this year on the island, also the marking of the road from Tormentine to Aulac referred to by the President. This matter has been taken up with the New Brunswick Association, permission having been given by the Minister of Public Works for New Brunswick. The cost will be about \$150.

The President, Mr. H. C. Brown, Mr. T. B. Grady, Engineer Scott and the Secretary went to Borden recently to see what could be done to improve the facilities for hand lining cars on and off the Car Ferry with view of cutting down the time at present required.

Short addresses followed by Mr. Gordon C. Hughes, vice president, and Mr. Justice Arsenault, who spoke of the close relation of the work of the Motor League and the Tourist Association.

The officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows:—Honorary President, Judge Arsenault; President, J. A. Webster; Vice President, G. C. Hughes, other directors for Charlottetown, M. P. Titus, Secretary-Treasurer; Dr. J. E. Blanchard and Dr. Heath McIntyre.

It was decided to defer the election of directors for Summerside, Hunter River and Montague until later. The following other directors were elected: Tignish, J. B. Myrick, Alberton, J. Willard, Wausgan, Borden, Armet, Howatt, and Chas. McDonald, Mt. Stewart, R. C. Clark, Georgetown, Glen Jenkins, Souris, Roy C. McLean. The number of the Executive was increased from 12 to 15.


