

ISLAND MARKSMEN AT OTTAWA RANGE ARE STILL TO THE FRONT

Weather Conditions Again Unfavorable For Good Shooting. Five Islanders in Line For Honors and Have Captured Several Prizes

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 28—Weather conditions were most difficult today and as a result there are many broken aggregates and the leaders of yesterday have changed places with men who could read the baffling wind of today.

CONTROL OF STREETS

RAILWAYS, NOT WAR, IN CANADA

OTTAWA, August 27—A species of symposium on naval defence of the empire took place at a luncheon at the Chateau Laurier today, Sir Wilfrid Laurier making his first utterance on the subject since the end of the session, and Sir Arthur Lawley, former lieutenant-governor of Madras, and Arthur Grenfell, chairman of the Canadian agency, speaking from the British standpoint. The leader of the opposition assumed a negative attitude, in effect doubting the existence of the German peril and depreciating "the mad race of armaments." The two English visitors presented the serious aspect of the situation, Sir Arthur Lawley making a speech of extraordinary brilliance and power. The occasion was the visit to Ottawa of the party of financiers and legislators which the Canadian agency is taking to Western Canada. About sixty residents of Ottawa were present, the party including several ministers and Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Arthur Grenfell, who presided, in his speech urged a word of warning to Canadian municipalities, saying

that in the past they had been somewhat spoiled, and had been given rather better terms than the market absolutely warranted. The political situation, in fact was that Germany found herself very strong, and was anxious to find a place in the sun. The difficulty was that the British of a century ago had forestalled her, and that she found two obstacles in her way, France and Great Britain. There was only one way of preventing war. That was for the several partners in the British empire to say: "There shall be no war." There was a mad race of armaments. The Germans were building ships and the race would be stopped only by one nation being persuaded that it must be a second. "As Britishers, we are determined to be first. The only way to avoid this catastrophe is for all Britishers to stand shoulder to shoulder." Sir Wilfrid Laurier after some general observations said that in Great Britain they were always thinking of war, "In this country we never think of war." Canada had only one neighbor and with

that neighbor she had no war for one hundred years. Mr. Grenfell had alluded to the German peril, the leader of the opposition continued. He was relieved when he said that what Germany was seeking was a place in the sun. "If that is all there is nothing to fear, for there is place enough in the sun for all. The German peril does not exist." He repeated Mr. Grenfell's remark about the mad race of armaments, and said: "Thank God, we have been free on this continent from that. Shall we go into that mad race or shall we continue to settle our difficulties by arbitration? That is the problem we want to settle here. The British empire was composed of different nations and the problems of these nations were different. "You think all the time of armaments and spend half your revenue upon them; we think of railways and canals." He did not believe that England could be in danger. If she were, every British subject would be on her side. But the best way for the British empire was to live according to the principle of

Nothing has been heard from De Leon since he left his brother's home in Chicago on August 9th, saying that he was going to Saginaw, Mich. and from there into the northern woods for a fishing trip. He is said to have had considerable money with him. E. W. De Leon of Chicago, brother of the missing man, and president of the Casualty Company, today notified relatives here that the Saginaw police had been unable to discover if the builder ever arrived there.
