NEW YORK, March 11—The European situation still seems far from being cleared up. Both France and Belgium are seeking military and economic sanctions unless Germany lives up to the Locarno Treaty. Other signatories to the treaty are less demanding. There will be a meeting tomorrow in connection with the treaty and the League of Nations will meet on Saturday. Those who are well informed on the European situation do not seem to be particularly disturbed, nevertheless, the uninformed, and there are many of these who own securities are nervous about the European situation which will probably cause considerable irregularity in the stock market.

Dividend meetings scheduled for today are Air Reduction, Continental Oil, Kaufmann Dept Stores, Pacific Gas and Elec, and United Shoe Machine. We would look for some extension of the rally today, but do not believe the advance

will continue in an important way, at least without some further backing and filling. There are some stocks, however, which may break away from the rest of the list and included in those possibilities are Sterling Products, Seaboard Oil, Farm Implements, Gulf Oil and Standard Oil of New Jersey.

TORONTO, March 11—Gold shares widened their decline today on the Toronto mining share market, dropping 77 to 125.11 in the exchange index. Miscellaneous mines had about the same set back on volume that lagged in the early trading and speeded up a little in the late session. Volume at 1,121,000 was up about 170,000 shares from Tuesday.

A feeling of nervousness over the possibility of war in Europe was no doubt responsible for the marking down of prices. Base metal stocks were fully as weak as the golds, Noranda leading the field with a loss of 1-4 to 47 3-4. Hudson Bay was off 1-4 in light turnover and Sudbury Basin dropped 15 cents.

Among the big golds Lake Shore, Dome and McIntyre registered fractional advances on light trading and active buying in Bralorne boosted the price 25 cents to 87. Wright Hargreaves and Hollinger were off 10 to 20 cents. In the penny stocks losses predominated.

MONTREAL, March 11—Bullish sentiment in brokerage houses was restrained only by the comparative smallness of the day's trading volume. While the Associated Press average of 60 stocks pushed up 3 of a point to 62.8, transfers totalled 2,304,390 against 2,339,700 in the previous session.

The list got off to a fairly brisk start, with farm implement, oil, alcohol and aircraft equities pointing the upward way. Despite the subsequent dull periods, and the evidence of some profit taking in scattered issues, most of the favorites held or bettered their gains and the major group was around their best at the sound of the closing gong.

Rubbers, aircraft and mines responded to thoughts that, whether the present Franco-German dispute over the Rhineland eventuates hostilities or not, orders for war materials may be expected from countries desiring to build up their defences. U. S. Government securities eased in the bond division while corporation loans were fairly steady. Leading foreign exchanges gave ground to the dollar.

PRINTING COSTS

DIED SUDDENLY

John Pieter Dionysius Van Veer, translator in the secretary of state department, died suddenly here today. He was 69 years of age. Born near Ede, Holland. Mr. Van Veer came to Canada about 40 years ago, and operated a cattle ranch in Western Canada for a number of years. He lived later in Montana and Connecticut before coming to Ottawa in 1913. His widow and one son survive.

TARIFF BOARD

The tariff board today disposed of two applications, one dealing with a request for upward revision of duties on sporting equipment, the other for free entry of photographic equipment when used by professional photographers. The first was opposed strenuously, the second had no opposition.

For the professional photographers of the House of Commons for Prince, P.E.I., presented the case, the request having originated in the Maritime Province. It was supported by C. H. Cunningham of Hamilton, Secretary of the Ontario Society of Professional Photographers. Canadian Kodak Co. of Toronto was represented by M. J. Patton and E. S. Currie, while J. C. Macfarlane appeared for the Canadian General Electric Co. and C. A. Hunter for Canadian Westinghouse.
