"M. A. P." advertising to this always interesting if somewhat threadbare subject, declares that recently "an American lady actually wrote a countess offering her the sum of £100,000 if she would include her in a house party she was gathering together to meet a royal personage at her place in the country. When she wrote the letter containing the offer she had no idea that the person she was addressing was short of cash, but it so happened that such was the case, and in the end the American lady achieved her desire.

Unfortunately she was a desirable person socially or the countess might have been serious for her hostess. As it happened, the royal personage—who was always partial to the American colony in London—took her up, and the purchased entertainment at Black Castle resulted in the darling American eventually entertaining royalty at her own house in London.

The writer of the creed is fair enough, however, to admit that it is quite erroneous to believe that all the "climbers" come from America. He says that, with the rise to vast wealth of some of the English middle class, they are overcome with a desire to shine in high society, and that many a young lady whose name is a household word as the result of her father's bank account entered the portals of the elite only after paying for her ticket at the door.
