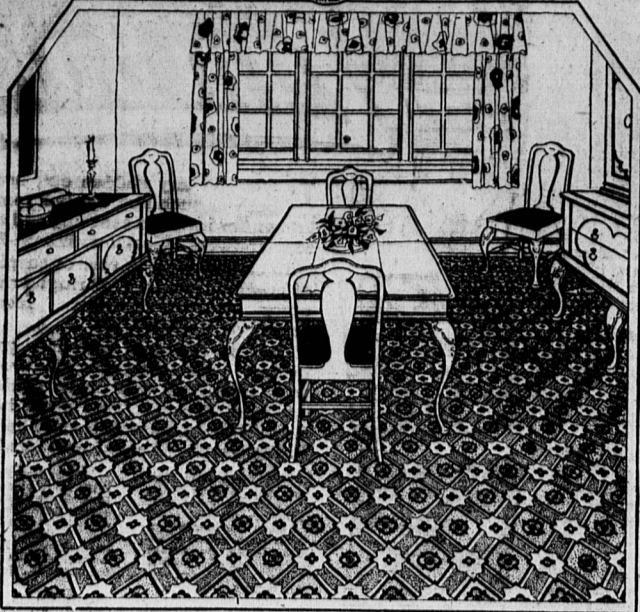

Canadian Pacific Earnings Increase

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., May 2.—The results of the year's operations accurately reflect the conditions which prevailed during that period and viewed from the standpoint of a sufficient margin in net earnings after charges and dividends, they

cannot be considered entirely satisfactory. E. W. Beatty, chairman and President of the Canadian Pacific Railway said today in addressing the annual meeting of the company's shareholders. The decrease in rates and increase in wages granted had their inevitable effect upon the earnings of your company and in addition expenditures on equipment and maintenance of way were substantial. Mr. Beatty continued. The gross earnings for the first three months of this year show an increase of \$3,864,778 and net earnings of \$1,651,672. If the same relative increase is maintained during the balance of the year, the surplus after charges will be ample to take care of the increased dividend requirements for the year. HAROLD F. RITCHIE HAS ACQUIRED J. C. ENO LTD.

The ownership of the firm of J. C. Eno, Limited, of London, England, makers of Eno's "Fruit Salt," changed hands last week. All the Preferred and Ordinary Shares were purchased by Mr. Harold F. Ritchie, of Toronto and New York. The sale to Mr. Ritchie took place on the celebration of Mr. Eno's birthday. Mr. Eno was born in 1828. One hundred years later, the business changed hands. The firm is also celebrating their diamond jubilee this year, as this is their sixtieth year in business selling Eno's "Fruit Salt" in every civilized country in the world.

This is Mr. Ritchie's twenty-first year with the firm as Sales Representative, having started in Canada, and now handles "Fruit Salt" and many other lines of Proprietaries in Canada and Newfoundland, United States, Mexico, Central America, South America, the West Indies, Australia, New Zealand, Hawaiian Islands, Philippine Islands, Pacific Islands and China, all through the Ritchie Sales Organization.

Vermont To Plant Two Million Trees

(Canadian Press) MONTPELIER, Vt., May 3.—More than two million trees will be set out in the state of Vermont this Spring as part of the reforestation program now under way throughout New England. The trees are to be planted by state nurseries to private land owners at a cost of six dollars a thousand. Most of the trees will be planted on so-called abandoned farm lands and worn out pasture lands, where the top soil is very thin. The trees are planted in rows six feet apart and about 1,200 trees are required to the acre. The flood of last November brought home to residents of the state the need of reforestation on the steep hillsides, where the soil is of light character. This type of land gullies and washes out badly during periods of heavy rain.
