## SOME DETAILS OF GHASTLY TRAGEDY

### In Which James W. Crawford and His Wife Both of Tryon, P. E. I. Were the Principals — Jealousy Was the Cause of Brockton's Most Horrible Murder and Revolting Suicide.

Late Brockton papers to hand give additional details of the gruesome tragedy in which James W. Crawford, late of Tryon, killed his wife with a shoemaker's knife, and then after arranging his own affairs suicided beside her dead body on her bed.

The authorities were of the opinion that the murderer was driven to the deed by an insane or unreasonable jealousy. All the employees where Mrs. Crawford worked united in speaking of her as a splendid woman. Crawford is said to have drank some but not to excess.

The Brockton Enterprise gives a conversation between Crawford and the barber whom he visited the Saturday afternoon before the tragedy, asking for a close shave. It says:—

"I should think you had a touch of malaria," remarked Mr. McKee, "your flesh is dry and hot and malarial in feeling."

"No, it is not that. That is not what the matter with me," replied Crawford, and as he spoke he glanced sharply and peculiarly at McKee.

"I knew from the look he gave me there was something on his mind," said Mr. McKee, "but of course I had no idea until later the meaning that was in that glance."

Mr. McKee said that Crawford was undoubtedly in his right mind at that time and there were no evidences of mental derangement. He talked with McKee at various times about his wife and that he was passionately fond of her was apparent. He spoke at one time of her dying her hair and remarked it to be a piece of "foolishness" as she looked better in his eyes as she was.

The following extracts are also from the Brockton Enterprise:—

**EMPTY TWO-OUNCE LAUDANUM BOTTLE.**

The discovery of an empty laudanum bottle on the floor beside the bed in which the dead bodies of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Crawford were found yesterday reveals a startling incident of the crime. It furnishes also the clue to long premeditation of the crime. It was on July 28 that Crawford is stated to have commenced one of the two letters that he wrote on Sunday after the commission of the murder. It was on July 28 that he bought the two ounce bottle of laudanum.

Crawford first murdered his wife in a horrible manner, then wrote two letters Sunday morning, left the house and mailed the letters and then came back to the house. It is believed by many that, after undressing he laid down upon the bed beside his wife, drank the bottle of laudanum and then gashed his arm with the razor, and then his throat, making doubly certain of a fatal ending.

"MRS. CRAWFORD" IN DIVORCE LIBEL.

Some time ago James E. Atus sued for divorce from his wife, Eliza Atus. The petition was not allowed and Mrs. Atus entered a cross-suit for separation from her husband, which was allowed. The report of the proceeding in the case at the May term of Superior court in this city, printed May 6th, 1904, telling of the case as heard by the court the day before, says:—

"Judge White dismissed the libel of Mr. Atus for desertion and ordered a decree nisi, in favor of the wife, on the ground of cruel and abusive treatment and gave her custody of the boy. He dismissed that part of the libel which related to alleged unfaithfulness of Mr. Atus."

In this part "one Mrs. Crawford was named in the libel, but the allegation was not substantiated and did not enter into the granting of the divorce.

**LOVED HIS WIFE TO DISTRACTION.**

"Crawford united with the Masonic fraternity in Tryon and I do not think he transferred," said Mrs. Crozier. "He was a man of good character, honest, industrious and sober, and the only reason I can ascribe for his awful deed is an insane jealousy, for he loved his wife almost to distraction. He gave us no hint of domestic troubles. Their home was elegantly furnished. He worked steadily, as did his wife, and they had some money and everything the average couple could need. I do not believe he had any property, though I knew his wife had a bank account. My wife and I visited them within two weeks and he was at our house a few days ago. We usually talked about home and he seemed to cherish a great regard for the old place and always seemed to hope he could return. So far as I know Crawford has no relatives in this country and I know of none in Prince Edward Island. His wife's sister, Mrs. E. L. Mowry, and her aged mother and the nephew live in Aulburndale and I believe there are no other relatives."

Mr. Crozier and Mr. Leslie tried to see City Marshal William A. Boyden last night and explain their connection with the case, but he was not at his office when they called.

**MR. ATUS KNOWS NO REASON FOR JEALOUSY.**

James E. Atus, 222 Main street, who for 12 years employed Mrs. Addie A. Crawford, the murdered wife of James W. Crawford of Ford street, as book-keeper and clerk, arrived home from Plymouth late yesterday afternoon. News of the tragedy reached him through a telegram from William P. Grady. He left his place of business Saturday evening, he states, leaving Mrs. Crawford to look up at 11 o'clock, and the reason it was not open as usual yesterday morning was because he depended upon the murdered woman to do this.

"As soon as I received news of the tragedy I hastened to this city," he stated this morning. "Early last evening I visited City Marshal Boyden to learn the exact particulars and to ascertain if her nephew, Harry R. Robblee of Aulburndale, had returned home. I know nothing of the affair beyond this."

"Did you receive any communication either from Crawford or his wife?" "None. Nor did I suspect that anything of this kind was in view. So far as I know there was no occasion for any jealousy, though Crawford was a man of unusual disposition, taciturn and one that did not make friends easily. Since coming home I have learned from my daughter, to whom Mrs. Crawford confided some of her domestic troubles, that she had lived in fear of him for some time back."

"They came to this city from Prince Edward Island and the wife went to work for me about 12 years ago. When they first came here they lived with Mrs. E. L. Mowry, now of Aulburndale, and a sister of the murdered woman, who at that time kept a boarding house on Allen street in this city. She moved away eight years ago. They lived on Bay street, later on Ash street, where Mr. Robblee, who is a carpenter and now foreman of a shop in Aulburndale, lived with them for a time, after which they moved to Ford street, about nine years ago."

Mr. Atus said he would attend the funeral. He knew little about Mrs. Crawford's affairs, he said.

Mrs. Katherine Murphy of Ford street saw Mr. Crawford Saturday noon returning from the factory. Knowing that he usually came home at night she asked him if he was having a half holiday or was ill. To this Mrs. Murphy said he replied, "No, I'm not sick. That wife of mine is going off again to-night, that's all."

Crawford had been employed in several factories in this city and was for some time employed in C. S. Pierce's box factory. Fellow employees stated today that he was touchy and easily provoked. If his foreman found fault with his work or a fellow workman said something disagreeable he would give up his job. He was an excellent workman they said.

The couple were childless after the death of a six-year-old child in Kensington 13 years ago, just before they came to Brockton. This was when they resided in that town.
