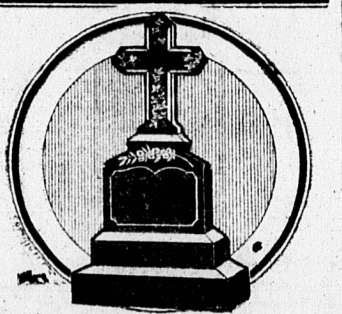

—Dunk River Institute met at Wilmont on March 22nd with the President presiding. Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. A communication from the Commissioner of Agriculture on the protection of sheep from dogs was read and discussed by the large number present. T. J. Humphrey favored the placing of a tax on dogs with the object of lessening their number and also to create a fund to remunerate farmers having sheep destroyed by dogs. The President also spoke along the same lines. Robert Agnew said he agreed with what Mr. Humphrey had said. John Burrows thought a tax should be imposed to protect sheep and that it would rid the country of a lot of worthless curs. Percy Marchbank was also favorable to the proposition. It was moved and carried unanimously that the Institute favor the placing of a tax of one dollar on male and three dollars on female dogs, such tax to form a fund for the purpose of remunerating those having sheep destroyed by dogs. A letter was read from the Frost & Wood Co., Ltd., soliciting an order from the Institute for binder twine. No action was taken. The Sheep Industry, which was laid over from the last meeting, was then taken up for discussion, taken part in by the President, P. Marchbank, John Burrows, Edward Clarke and others, after which the meeting adjourned to meet at Upper Freeway on a date to be named by the Secretary, Robert P. Burns.

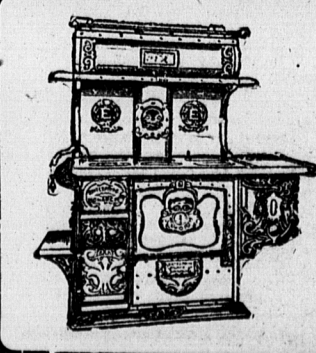

FOUND DEAD WITH SMILE ON FACE.

VIENNA, March 27—A party of 11 skiers, were overwhelmed by an avalanche near the summit of Schneeberg, near Vienna yesterday, and ten persons were killed. Two wood cutters, coming down the mountain heard groans from beneath the snow, they dug hastily and discovered a woman with her clothes torn and so exhausted that there is little hope for her recovery, she gasped, "avalanche, dig deeper" and then fainted. They laid her on the snow and after much work recovered the corpse of the leader of the party. Dr. Hacker, then they conveyed the woman, Fraulein Bana Taglicht, who is the sole survivor of the tragedy, to the hotel. Owing to a heavy snowstorm last night relief expedition was without result, but this morning several detachments of soldiers on skis proceeded to the spot. Later nine bodies, including some women have been recovered. It is remarkable that the faces of all the victims wore happy expressions, which seems to indicate that death was instantaneous.
