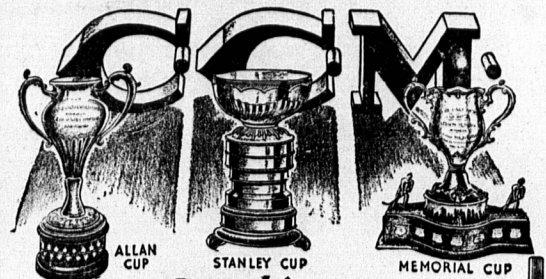

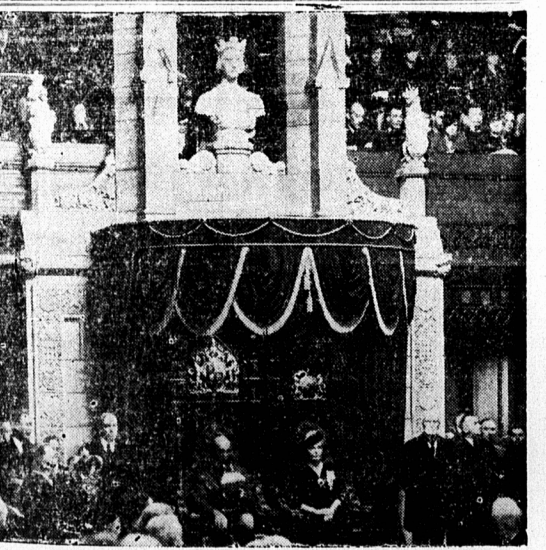

## Jackie Callura Earns Draw

TORONTO, Nov. 11 (CP)—Jackie Callura, hard-hitting young Hamilton fighter, fought to a 10-round draw with George Pace of Cleveland, former world bantam champion, in a main bout tonight billed as a featherweight elimination match.

Callura almost knocked Pace out in a whirlwind first round. He knocked the champion down twice, once for a three count, and a split second later he had him flat on his back again for a count of nine. Pace barely wobbled to his feet in time to save himself from being the victim of a knockout.

It marked the first time the colored star had ever been knocked off his feet. A crowd of about 4,500 fans attended the first fight show here since last spring.

## She Doesn't Yell Her Foil Speaks

HICKSVILLE, N.Y., Nov. 12 (CP)—Helena Mroczkowska is a good fencer. United States national women's champion in fact, but her instructor tells her she'd be better if she'd learn to yell. "It's the custom of fencers to shout 'Eh, la,' meaning 'got you that time' as they brandish a foil in the face of an opponent. You're supposed to shout this whether you've scored a touch or not, just to confuse the enemy. 'But Helena is a quiet girl and her 'Eh, la,' comes out in a mild little whisper. And if she misses a point she merely murmurs an undramatic 'Oh, gee.'"

Her instructor tells me I need more fire, and I guess I do," reports Helena, who isn't a know-it-all champion.

But, with or without fire, she has a deadly thrust with a foil. She has, on occasion, actually wounded her opponents, scratched them at least, while she herself never has been hurt.

Helena contends fencing is a pleasant social sport, cutting and slashing notwithstanding. It is estimated 250,000 persons in the United States participate in it. Fencing is good for the figure, it gives grace of movement. "Fencing never speak ill of each other," says Helena.

Aubin Blaquiere and Vincent "Pud" Roach, members of last year's Junior Royals Hockey team, Maritime Champions, leave today for Truro, it was learned unofficially yesterday. ## British Soccer Dodges Bombing Plays Fixtures

LONDON, Nov. 12 (CP)—British football, competing against German air raids as a Saturday afternoon attraction, is bearing up stubbornly in the most trying times it has ever known.

Forced by war contingencies to run its leagues on a goal average basis rather than on the usual "two points for a victory, one for a draw" system, the Football Association, of which the Earl of Athlone, Canada's governor-general, is president, has seen gate receipts dwindle because of what the press calls lack of "the real competitive spirit."

Change in the system of compiling standings was made because it was believed games might have to be cancelled and because of lack of transportation facilities made a full schedule impossible.

After eight weeks of play, however, only a few games have been cancelled and sports writers generally have taken the goal-average system over the odds, claiming the standings give little indication of the true merits of the teams.

### Penalized for Winning

Arsenal, current leaders of the South Regional section, had a 5,000 average Oct. 12 before their match with Tottenham. They won the game 3-2 and their average fell to 4,000. The next week they beat Northampton 5-4 and dropped another point in the averages. Had they played two scoreless draws their average would have remained at 5,000 so they actually were penalized for winning.

"Sturdy" wrote G. Wagstaffe in the Sporting Life, "it need not be emphasized that there is something wrong with a system of reckoning that punishes clubs if they win but permits them to retain their average if no goals are scored."

Despite the criticism the Football Association decided to retain the system for the second half of the season, starting after the new year and continuing until the first week in May.

But to conciliate those who believe wins and losses are more important than goals, the Association arranged for a knock-out cup competition. It will begin after Christmas and run until May 3 when the final will be played.

Competition has been keen in both the Southern and Northern halves of the English league and there wasn't an unbeaten team after eight weeks' play. Arsenal, with seven victories in eight games, has been the pick of the southern half, while Manchester City, with five victories, two draws

### WEATHER MAN SERVICE IS HUNDREDS YEARS OLD

The meteorological service of the Department of Transport, which assists the Trans-Canada Air Lines in its operations by providing weather reports for the guidance of pilots, is a century old, according to Dr. John Patterson, controller. While observations began as early as 1840, the service was not fully organized until 1872. It has grown considerably since then. At first it was limited to the Great Lakes, the St. Lawrence River and the Atlantic seaboard and was extended as far west as Victoria in 1898. Originally it was intended to serve agriculture and forestry chiefly, but the coming of the air lines has given it new responsibilities. The technicians employed are graduates in mathematics and physics.
