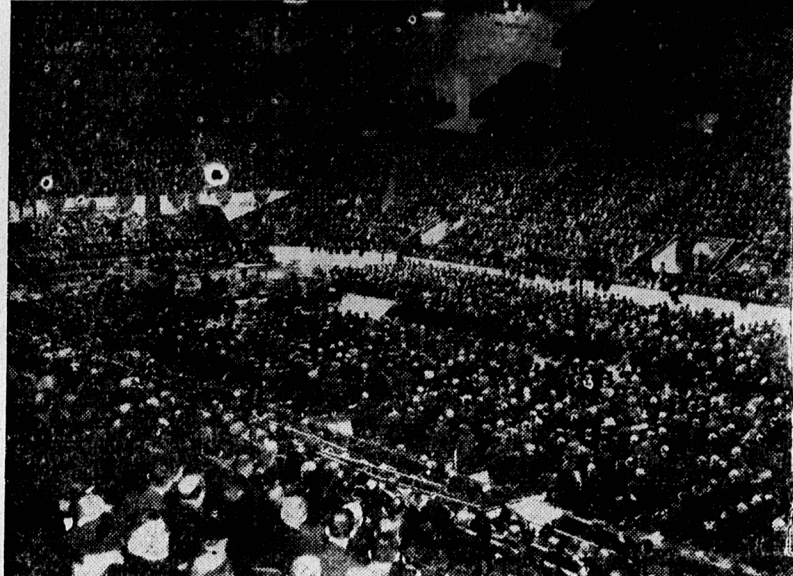

TORONTO, March 18—Maple Leaf Gardens, home of Toronto's hockey team, was the scene of tonight's Manion meeting, though the less ambitious Liberals had chosen Massey Hall as the site of the Mackenzie King rally here last week. It is 40 years

since Massey Hall was the place for big political rallies in Toronto, and the city has grown since that time. The optimism of the National Conservatives for tonight's meeting proved to be amply justified as early as 8 o'clock, despite the inclemency of the weather and the subsequent condition of highways leading into Toronto. For a hockey key match 13,000 may be seated, and this evening there was the large additional floor space, so an estimate of over 15,000 attendance is quite safe.

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## NAZIS ORDER U.S. CONSUL OUT OF POLAND

WASHINGTON, March 20 —(AP)—The German government has requested the withdrawal of the United States and other consulates in Warsaw, Poland, and the United States government has been forced to accede, the state department announced today. The German government the state department said, "has reserved all of its rights in the matter." The three United States consuls and vice consuls in Warsaw will report to the United States embassy in Berlin, which will now handle all matters in connection with American citizens now in Poland. Representations were made to the German government through the American embassy in Berlin. The state department said, "treating the difficulty of rendering assistance and protection to American citizens without consular representation in Warsaw." The German government, however, took the position that all foreign diplomatic and consular offices must withdraw. The department listed 532 American citizens as living in Poland on Jan. 1.
