Belated Revision
Of Polling Booths
For Fifth Queen's

Much Confusion Caused By Negligence Of Returning Officer In Not Furnishing List In Proper Time.
Voters' Qualifications Outlined

Yesterday morning The Guardian published, in good faith, the location of the polling booths for Charlottetown and Royalty as given in the Returning Officer's Proclamation. The Proclamation was issued from the Supreme Court House, Charlottetown, on July 31, 1931, for the Provincial General Election of August 6, 1931, and signed "David MacDonald, Returning Officer."

The qualification of voters for the Legislative Assembly are in substance as follows:
Every voter must be a person, male or female, of the age of twenty one years, a British subject and not subject to any legal incapacity, and must in addition be entitled to one of the following qualifications in—

Lea Gov't's "Record"
A Mere Patchwork Of Political Gestures!

If it had not been for the frantic efforts of the Lea Government to make election propaganda, the last session of the Legislature would have been the shortest on record. Measure after measure was introduced into committee for no other purpose apparently, than to bulldoze the public and make political capital.

After abolishing statute labour, a gesture was made of re-introducing this system under an Act so designed as to give to the road officials of the Lea Government the power to pick and choose those who should have the privilege of commuting their taxes—a return to the patronage system at its worst, and a barefaced attempt to bribe the taxpayers with their own money!

Another hoped-for vote-catcher was the Ticket of Leave Act, a measure unheard of in any other Province, which already has had the effect of further stultifying the Prohibition Law in the interests of political heelers and partisans.

Another statute empowered the Government to raise the gasoline tax without the authority of the Legislature. Mr. Lea contended that this did not necessarily mean a tax increase; but almost immediately after the session the gasoline tax, which had already been raised from three to five cents a gallon by the Saunders Government, was increased to six cents; and no assurance has been given that still further increases by Order in Council will not be made if the Lea Government should be returned to power.

The pretence at a belated implementation of the Liberal platform with respect to the payment of railway taxation to the city and incorporated towns and villages was another striking instance of political chicanery and insincerity. As the Opposition members pointed out, this pledge could have been implemented at the session of 1928 just as easily as in 1931 if the Government was sincere, as they had obtained no additional federal revenue since that time. Moreover, the Government refused to state the amount they intended to pay the city and towns, and took no action beyond introducing the legislation as an empty gesture.

Perhaps the most significant political gesture was the repeated insistence on federal issues, culminating in a resolution introduced by the Hon. Horace Wright, ex-Progressive free-trader, protesting against the tariff policy of the Bennett Government, over which the time of the House was wasted in an unprofitable debate having for its sole object the relishing of the questions raised and decided upon by the electors in the federal election of last year.

Even the Public Accounts Committee was prostituted by the Lea Government for the purposes of political propaganda. Special meetings were called for the purpose of concocting this propaganda. And when the Opposition members of the Committee requested permission to refute certain misstatements made before the Committee by the Provincial Auditor, the request was refused on the ground that the statements in question had been improperly heard in the first place, and had no bearing on last year's Public Accounts!

All through the session, the same unscrupulous campaign was in evidence showing clearly the panic into which the Government was thrown by the prospect of facing the people and the lengths to which it was prepared to go to fool and hoodwink the people!
