"Yapping", Says Mr. Howe

The Maritime Provinces of Canada owe nothing, and less than nothing, to the Hon. Clarence DeLoach Howe, American-born Minister of Munitions in the King Government.

"I never yapped at anything. The Minister is doing all the yapping now. And I say, too, that that is a very rude statement and he ought to take it back."

It was at this point that the Hon. Clarence DeLoach Howe exploded: "If the Maritimes keep yapping about them—" he said.

Then And Now
Back in June, 1920, M. Mackenzie King, on third reading of a bill confirming certain specified Orders-in-Council, eloquently declared: "It is beneath the dignity of Parliament—indeed, it is bringing Parliament into contempt—to ask us to enact as law a code of regulations that we have not even perused."

The Commons Election Committee recommend that in the next general election the lapse of time between official nomination day and election day be extended from 14 to 28 days to allow more time for the taking of the armed services' vote.

Hogs on farms were reported, December 1st, 1943, as 2.1 million in Alberta; 1.5 million in Ontario; 1.3 million in Saskatchewan. Fair evidence of how rapidly Western agriculture will become permanent mixed farming, when economic conditions justify such a policy and what competition we in the east will be up against.

Mr. E. G. Carlisle, Canadian Pacific Air Lines, in the Quarterly Review of Commerce, reminds us that 700 aircraft, carrying 100 passengers each, could move the entire population of Canada to the U. K. and back each year.

Captain Robert Falconer Scott, R.N., English explorer, died this date 1912; best known as commander of two Antarctic expeditions; the first took place in 1906-4, and its story is recorded in his graphic "Voyage of the 'Discovery'"; in 1910 he set out for the South Pole again, aboard the "Terra Nova", an old Scotch whaler; in Jan. 18, 1912, he and his party reached the Pole, only to find Amundsen's Norwegian explorer, had forestalled them by a month.

The cumulative total of British mutual aid to the United States to December, 1943, was, in respect to capital installations in the United Kingdom £135,000,000, to goods and services £133,000,000, and to shipping services £70,000,000.

Beer quota days are but a memory in Winnipeg with permit holders allowed a case of beer per day at government liquor stores and beer parlors getting what customers described as "ample" supplies.

"Sixty per cent of French Canadians are townpeople; hardly 22.37% are farmers, says 'Relations.'" THE ARMOUR OF LIGHT

"The armour of light" is one of the most poetic metaphors in the writings of St. Paul. In itself it is a vivid paradox. Nothing could be more solidly material than armour, while the necessary weight and hardness, nothing, again, could be more immaterial than light, which is arrested by the human material substance. Yet upon light and upon man's power to see it, depend not only all the beauty, but the continuing life of the world.

St. Paul here joins together two distinct concepts of each of which separately he made frequent use. By uniting them, he called into being a figure of striking power and beauty. The idea of armour evokes the masculine and careful vigour of the Christian life. The soldierly qualities of courage, resourcefulness, and determination, are strongly suggested.
