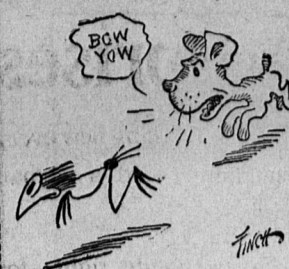

DR. CAVEN

By the death of Dr. Caven, yesterday morning, Charlottetown has lost its most highly cultured citizen—one whose ability was proven as teacher, lecturer, editor, poet and singer. The deceased gentleman was an octogenarian. He maintained his health, strength and spirits wonderfully, until within a few weeks of his passage to the unseen world. Educated at Edinburgh and in Rome he came to P. E. Island about forty-five years ago; and was for many years engaged as professor of literature at St. Dunstan's College and Prince of Wales College, as editor of the Charlottetown Herald and in other capacities—in all of which his extensive knowledge and power of finished literary expression were exhibited. For many years he was leading member of the choir of St. Dunstan's Cathedral. Dr. Caven is survived by four children, two sons, William in Montreal and John at home, and two daughters, Miss Kate at home, and Mrs. Birling, in Three Rivers, Quebec. All his acquaintances were with him at his death. His wife, who was Miss Katherine Rigg, of Scotland, predeceased him twenty-six years ago.

LATE MR. MATHEW SHEEN

The death took place at his late residence in Kensington on Wednesday evening at nine o'clock, August 19th, ult., of Mr. Mathew Sheen, one of the most respected and highly honored citizens of that place. The late Mr. Sheen who was born Sept. 10th, 1832 had always enjoyed splendid health up to his eightieth year when his advanced age caused him failing health but still he kept going about until within a day or two before his death, being fully conscious to the last. 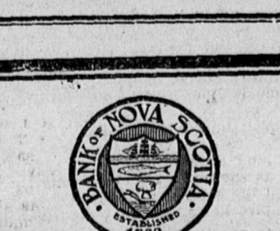

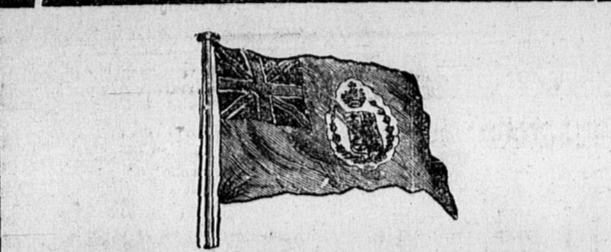

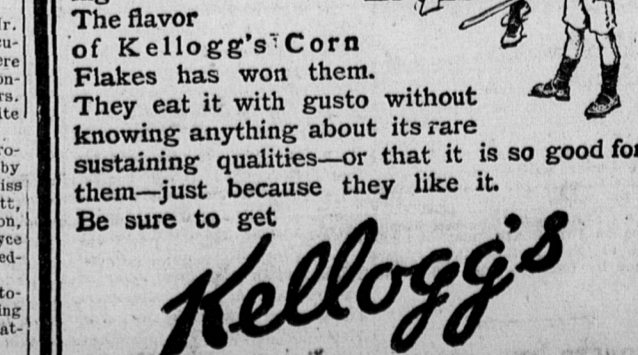
