SWIMMERS RESCUE ITALIAN LABORERS

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—Three daring swimmers rescued the two Italian laborers who for more than forty hours had been imprisoned in the East river tunnel by a cave-in at the Long Island city end. Surrounded by water which threatened to engulf them the moment the compressed air should fall to hold it in check, the two entombed men had kept up constant communication with the surface by rapping on the pipes which brought them air. They were swam up to the platform on which they were huddled and it was with difficulty the rescuers induced the frightened men to plunge into the water they had dreaded so long. Finally this was accomplished, the two strong swimmers, each taking a man upon their back while the third swam alongside to lend assistance in case of need.
