SEALER FARED WELL IN SOUTH ATLANTIC

HALIFAX, N. S., February 11.—The Halifax sailing vessel, Eva June, has arrived at Montevideo, after several months of seal hunting in the South Atlantic, and is being towed to the north by the tug here. The vessel sailed from Halifax September 1, and did not make harbor again until she arrived at Cape Horn and north to the Behr. The vessels, 100 tons or thereabouts, ploughed their way around Cape Horn and north to the Behr. In the sealing grounds spread their hunting boats in fan shape from there. Each vessel carried about eight of these craft, and they were manned by two men each, a hunter and a steerer. The hunter carried a heavy double-barrelled gun. The South Atlantic replaced the Pacific grounds in fact in the early years of the 20th century, however, and in 1914, the last Nova Scotia vessel engaged in it discontinued the hunt. The Eva June revived the industry locally in 1920, and has operated profitably since. She is commanded by Captain Matthew Ryan, of Sydney, a veteran of the Pacific days. Nova Scotia and British Columbia pooled interests in the sealing days, and Bluerose vessels were common sight in Victoria harbor.

A number of Nova Scotia skippers never returned to their homes in the hunt, but settled in the British Columbia capital, and are to be found there yet.

INDIAN APPOINTMENTS

LONDON, February 12.—A Reuters despatch from Delhi, India, says that the Indian Legislative Assembly, after debating with much animation a resolution moved by an Indian member that recruit ment for all government services except the technical branches, be made in India as far as possible, accepted a government representative's amendment that the government immediately obtain the opinions of all local governments regarding the measures for increasing the recruitment of Indians for all Indian services.

10-HOUR DAY RESTORED

CHICAGO, February 12.—Re-establishment of a ten-hour day at the steel hourly wage, and abolition of time and one-half pay for regularly assigned work on Sundays and holidays, new rules governing railway signal men, were announced tonight by the United States Railroad Labor Board to replace, on February 16, the National agreement made under federal control.

The board's rules affect more than 12,000 rail workers. Overtime pay is likewise eliminated for employees paid on a monthly salary by a new formula for determining the monthly rate, based on the standard hourly rate.

Great Britain May Reassure Prem. Poincare

LONDON, Feb. 13.—Parliamentary discussion of the King's speech thus far tends to confirm the desire of the Government to offer France a guarantee against aggression on the lines of the Joint Agreement of 1919, but there is a notable disinclination to extend the scope of its responsibilities. The debate also disclosed the existence of opposition to the pact in any shape or form, particularly on the part of Labour and supporters of the League of Nations. Mr. Robert Cecil regards the pact as an infringement of the prerogatives of the League. Outside of Parliament there is a considerable working opinion for the pact.

France's plea for security against Germany led many people, generally opposed to Continental commitments, to sympathize with her viewpoint and regard such a guarantee as the necessary preliminary to French co-operation in reconstruction. No sooner, however, was removal of the pact by Britain alone mooted, than Poincare's reaction indicated a military offensive defensive alliance.

Simultaneously the French attitude towards European problems became more uncompromising and attempts to limit the possibilities of the Geneva conference proceeded apace. French opinion proper demanded that Great Britain should accept a reciprocal guarantee. Britain does not want this but is inclined to accept it to soothe French sensibilities. What Great Britain does want in exchange is the sincere collaboration of France in remedying European chaos and establishing real peace among nations. This entails a change of attitude toward Germany, to which France is increasingly opposed, and consideration of the Russian problem in the light of contemporary facts and requirements.

British opinion overwhelmingly condemns Bolshevism and all its works but cannot understand the political value of the moral scruples which, as in the case of France, would apparently be overcome by the Soviet's acceptance of the

RUSSIANS IN PARIS.

CHURCH ASSEMBLY TALKED FINANCES

LONDON, February 12.—Questions of finance bulked large in the concluding sitting of the national assembly of the Church of England at Westminster.

It was decided, on motion of Earl Grey, to close the Knutsford clergy test school, which was established to help capable men be trained for the ministry.

The Bishop of Chester pleaded for the retention of the school in a modified form with fewer bursaries and civilian candidates, said the Church was getting very short of clergymen, and the candidates would not nearly make up the shortage.

Sir Lewis Diben said the assembly had no money to carry on the ordinary business of the Church and had to ask members to lead money without security, therefore it was impossible to assume responsibilities and liabilities.

The Archbishop of York reluctantly supported Sir Lewis Diben, declaring that their first task must be to restore the assembly's financial credit and regain the confidence of Church people.

The assembly adopted a motion by Lord Hunch Ceel, on behalf of the Bishop of London, appointing a committee of 15 members to prepare a measure dealing with London city churches and their revenues. Lord Ceel said that 1,700,000 pounds could be obtained by removing 19 of these churches.

The opponents of this motion denounced the proposal as sacrilege, or urged aesthetic considerations by pointing out that the churches in question included some of Christopher Wren's masterpieces of architecture. Some supporters of the motion said the Church must follow the example of the land owners, and sell some of her treasures to provide her children's needs including better salaries for the clergy.

HOW A PIECE OF ROME WAS FOUND

Some little time ago an Italian gentleman, who is an authority on Ancient Rome, was staying with the Duke of Devonshire at Chateworth.

In the library there he took up a book containing a plan of the Quirinal one of the seven famous hills on which the city is built. This plan showed that there had once been Roman baths on the slope of this hill, like those at Bath.

Greatly interested in this discovery the Italian, on returning to Rome, arranged for digging to be begun on the spot indicated, and now the remains of these very large buildings have been exposed to view. The last time they were brought to light was in the fifteenth century. The site was, then the vineyard of a cardinal, who carried his treasures off to Venice, his native city. After that the vine yard was soon built over and the baths were completely forgotten, until the chance which led the Italian in an English country house to pick up a book caused them to be remembered again.
