ISLAND TEACHERS' TRIP - Miss Marion Stewart, daughter of Mr. James Stewart, Pownal St., left Wednesday morning for Calgary to resume her duties as teacher there, after spending a week in Charlottetown. Miss Stewart has just returned from England where she spent the past year teaching in the schools of London. It will be remembered that the League of the Empire arranged that fifty teachers from Canada were to go to England to teach in schools there, whilst fifty English teachers were to come to Canada; Miss Stewart being the only Prince Edward Islander among the Canadian teachers. She arrived in London on August 20th, 1921, and taught in twenty London Council Schools or public schools in different parts of the city.

FRENCH VICTORY MEDAL

PARIS, Aug 17 - The law prescribing the conditions of the French Victory Medal was promulgated today.

Soldiers and nurses of Allied countries are eligible for the award if they served for eighteen months (consecutive or not) in the army zones of the front in France, or in the zones of operations in other theatres of war, directly under the orders of the French command. Soldiers, sailors, and nurses of certain units are eligible if they can point to three months' service under French Command.

The design for the medal will be decided by competition. On one side will be a winged victory, and on the other the inscription "La grande guerre pour la civilisation."

IN MEMORIAM

DR. ROBERT F. LAWLESS.

A deep sorrow and gloom was cast over Little Pond and vicinity on Thursday, July 27th, when it was learned that one of its highly esteemed and most respected young men in the person of Dr. Robert F. Lawless had suddenly died of heart failure in the Grand Central Terminal, New York, on his way to his home in Little Pond, to spend his vacation. Death is sad at any time, but when it cuts down one in the prime of life is doubly sad, and it is to be regretted in this case, for it has claimed for its own one who by his kind and gentle disposition won for him many friends, both old and young. Dr. Lawless was 42 years of age, and was well known throughout this province. He was engaged as a teacher for several years. From that he attended Yale University, where he graduated as a Medical Doctor, and went to Stanford, Conn., where he practiced medicine until his demise. Doctor Lawless was consoling by the last rites of the Roman Catholic church, of which he was a devoted and consistent member, and on Friday, July 28, his remains were taken to New Britain to the home of his brother, and on Monday, July 31, a High Mass of Requiem was sung by Rev. Dr. O'Brien, and all that was mortal of a kind and loving son and brother was laid to rest in the Roman Catholic cemetery in Chester, Conn.

Besides a large circle of friends and relatives are left to mourn five heart-broken sisters, Mrs. Michael McDonald, Little Pond; Mrs. Daniel J. McDonald, Little Pond; Mrs. Wm. Howlett, Gowan Brae; Mrs. Frank McAulay, St. Peter's Bay; Mrs. John Delubery, Buffalo, N.Y., and an only brother, Paul, New Britain, Conn. The heartfelt sympathy of the community goes out to the sorrowing family in their sore bereavement. May his soul, which graced his body in this life, find eternal rest in heaven.
