THE pulpit of St. James church was occupied yesterday at both services by Rev. S. J. McArthur of New Glasgow N. S. The reverend gentleman made a very favorable impression.

For the Maritime Winter Fair which opens at Amherst to-day and concludes on Thursday a most attractive program including addresses by leading men of the west and of the Maritime Provinces is promised.

THE Lanenburg came into port Saturday afternoon and moored off the end of Pownal wharf. During the evening a large cake of ice broke the moorings and carried her considerable distance up the river before she was able to get on steam and return by her own power.

THE steamer Restigouche, of the North American Transportation Company, with cargo of coal, arrived at Quebec on Wednesday afternoon. The steamer left Sydney on Saturday 3rd and has made the passage safely, notwithstanding that she was without the assistance of the ice breaking steamers or other aid to navigation.

THE annual meeting of the Northern Agricultural Institute was held in Mayfield Hall on the 4th. The President Wm. Laird occupied the chair. The report of the Directors showed this Institute to be in a flourishing condition both financially and otherwise. The following is a list of the addresses and papers delivered during the year; address on "Agriculture" by the President Wm. Laird delivered in Mayfield Hall; address on "General Information" by the Vice President Lemuel Clark at Mayfield; a paper on Material and Social Improvement by A. Moffatt in Cavendish Hall; an address on Improved Transportation Facilities by Geo. R. McNeil in New Glasgow Hall; paper on "Exhibitions" by Walter Simpson at North Rustico; "Current Events" by Wm. Moffatt in Mayfield Hall. Besides the meetings already mentioned two others were held; one addressed by Messrs Campbell and Ross, the other by Messrs Sheppard & Anderson, reports of which have already appeared in the local papers.
