- Voting qualifications (General). All males and females must be: (a) 21 years of age and upwards, (b) Resident of City for One Year, (c) British Subjects, (d) All Civic Taxes and Assessments paid on or before December 31st, 1933.

- And must be: (1) Owner of freehold of lands or premises for 3 months previous to the Election to the value of One Hundred Dollars, (2) Males—Tenant or occupant for 3 months of annual rental value of fourteen dollars, (3) Males—who have paid Poll Tax of three dollars for 1933 on or before December 31st, 1933, (4) Male and female inhabitants, non-resident of the City who are owners of freehold of land or premises or tenants or occupants as above.

REPORT OF ELECTRICAL INSPECTOR

Presented to the City Council by Mr. W. P. Doull at Thursday night's meeting.

To His Worship the Mayor and City Councillors: Filing as I do the dual position of Building Inspector and Electrical Inspector under two distinctly different by-laws calls for what might be termed a double-barreled report of the activities and progress of these two spheres of City development.

These figures however do not give any idea of the number of visits these jobs call for. In numerous cases one permit has called for ten, fifteen, and sometimes twenty visits as work progresses, in order to allow parts of the work to be covered up before others have been installed.

Perhaps the most serious brush was with Mr. Donaldson (the Vice-President of the Lighting Company) when here with a number of his other officers last summer. A discussion was in progress regarding the proper installing of meters when Mr. Donaldson came out from the private office and was about to end the argument in a single sentence, thus "We will not couple on another place in Charlottetown unless we put the meter right on the ends of the service lines."

JAMES A. McLAUGHLIN

(Halifax Star, January 13) The death of James A. McLaughlin, better known as "Jimmy," which occurred at Camp Hill Hospital yesterday, removes a figure long known by many of the citizens of a generation that is past. Of a quiet, unassuming nature, with a charming personality, to know him was to like him.

During the Great War, although over the age that would be required to give his service, he quickly volunteered and distinguished himself in France and during his military service. Since his return he has not been in the best of health, but carried on in the Attorney-General's Department for the past eight years. Coming into Camp Hill Hospital two months ago it was seen that his condition was serious, and during his last illness he received every care and attention possible.

As in the past few seasons our Mr. Calbeck set the standard for inspection staff and, we believe, the members are duly appreciative of this service. We are also pleased to report that no malignant epidemic obtains among Canadian foxes that we are being continually carried on both at Research Laboratories in Hull under the auspices of our Federal Government, as well as at the Welcome Research Laboratories

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near London, England, for which purpose this Association contributed fifty foxes two years ago. Your directors are well pleased to report that the finances of our organization are in a more healthy condition than last reported. Certain changes were made in our income and it was not necessary to dispose of securities in order to finance.

While the stabilization fund question was engaging the attention of our political leaders, your directors business executives, you as well as made representations to the government by correspondence as well as by the personal contact of directors with their federal representatives that the product of our industry be included in the list of commodities to be benefited thereby, but with the rise of sterling exchange the necessity for this passed.

Again when the Royal Commission on banking headed by Lord Macmillan had our banking system under review, representations were made to this Commission suggesting that section 88, sub-section 13 of our present Bank Act be amended to include live silver foxes on which a bank would be justified in making a loan for an owner. We regret to report that our efforts in this connection were abortive.

Our Fur Marketing Department was in operation throughout the past year as usual and we believe results were equally gratifying to clients. Your directors are pleased to report that our relations with the Federal Department of Agriculture and the Canadian National Live Stock Records have been most cordial and satisfactory.

Financial Statement of our Association showed total expenses for the year ending December 31, 1933, \$38,794.60, leaving a surplus of \$296.50. Total assets of the organization are given at \$249,832.42. The organization's co-operative marketing department showed assets of \$37,183.69 with a balance on operating account of \$9,822.23.
