Patriot Not Consulted
 How closely the local Liberal organ is in touch with the policy of its Government at Ottawa will be seen from the following statements, both given out on the same day:
THE PATRIOT
 "We are told by the Steel Companies that we might, with their gracious permission of course, raise the duties against the United States and lower them against Great Britain. WHY THIS GENEROSITY? If duties were increased on imports from the United States it would enable our friends the steel manufacturers to recoup the increasing prices. THE COMPETITION OF THE RELATIVELY SMALL IMPORTS FROM GREAT BRITAIN WOULD SCARCELY BE NOTICED. It would be a fourteen to one shot for these gentlemen. . . The fact is the steel companies of Canada are doing better than they ever did before—NOW IS NOT THE TIME TO GIVE THEM A FURTHER "HAND-OUT". IT WILL NOT BE THUS THAT THE BUDGET WILL BE REVISED."
THE GOVERNMENT
 "IRON AND STEEL: General adjustment of rates on all primary forms with INCREASES IN RATES on ingots, blooms and billets, sheets, bars, etc. Provisions of a tariff group to cover ferroalloys, all of which are made under the British preferential tariff. INCREASE IN RATES under all tariffs on structural steel in certain shapes and weights commercially rolled in Canada with reduced British preferential rates on very heavy sections and on all finished structural steel. INCREASES EXCEPT IN THE BRITISH PREFERENTIAL RATE on steel plates such as can be rolled in Canada. Free entry UNDER THE BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF on all such plates when of widths and weights not rolled in Canada. PROVISION FOR A BRITISH PREFERENCE on all kinds of hotrolled strip steel for use in cold rolling. INCREASES IN THE GENERAL TARIFF RATES on most coated sheets with provision for tin plate if and when made in Canada. PROVISION FOR DUTIES AFTER JANUARY 1, 1931, on black sheets imported for coating with metal. Reduction under all tariffs in rates on corrugated sheets. PROVISION FOR DUTIES ON SKELE if and when rolled in Canada. Provision for a British preference on saw steels untempered and extension on existing preference on saw steels tempered. PROVISION FOR AN AD VALOREM SUBTAX on alloyed steels. Extensions of existing British preference on wire and springs."—King Government Budget announcement, May 1, 1930.
