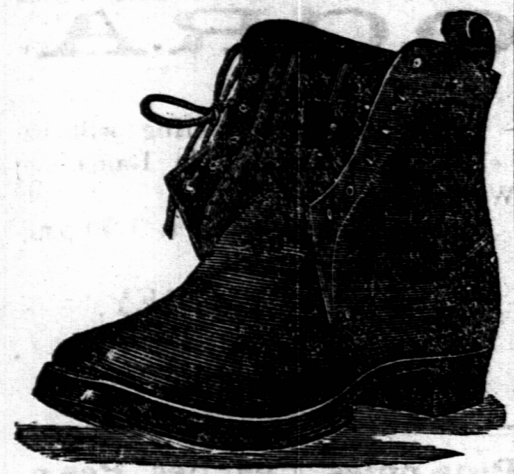

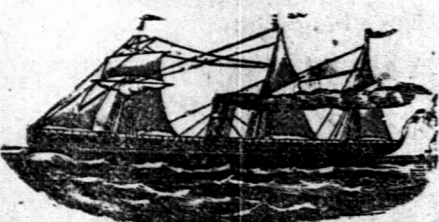

The New Century Perfect Speaker.

THE GUARDIAN has received from the editor, Mr. John A. Cooper, a large volume entitled as above. It contains 658 pages and is superbly illustrated. The mechanical execution of the work is highly creditable to the World Publishing Company of Guelph, Ont., by whom it is printed. The Perfect Speaker purports to be a complete encyclopaedia of elocution, oratory and etiquette, and includes lifelike portraits and brief biographies of the most distinguished statesmen, diplomats, divines and public speakers of Canada, Great Britain and the United States with specimens of their speeches, addresses and orations. The interesting and valuable preface to the work is from the pen of Hon. G. W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, himself one of Canada's model speakers. The contents of the volume are varied and interesting as the above outline would indicate. It opens with a well considered dissertation on elocution and physical culture with a page given to the ideas of Delsarte. The well-chosen selections are so grouped as to be readily accessible, touching upon art, national holidays, humor of all sorts, pathetic and homelike religious and sublime, sentiment, patriotism, pastoral beauty, dialogues, tableaux and home entertainments and selections for children. A gallery of great orators follows with excerpts from the speeches of Salisbury, Gladstone, Disraeli, Rosebery, Chamberlain, Sir John Macdonald, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Lord Dufferin, Sir Charles Tupper, Lord Lorne, Hon. Joseph Howe, Alexander MacKenzie, Edward Blake, Sir Francis Hincks, Sir Oliver Mowat, Cartier, Chapleau, Premier Ross, Nicholas Flood Davin, Sir William Dawson, Rev. Dr. Potts, Col. Dennison, Sir John Schultz, Archbishop Machray, Principal Grant, D'Arcy McGee, and Hon. George E. Foster. The American orators from whom extracts are made include Daniel Webster, T. B. Reed, Phillips Brooks, Abraham Lincoln, Rev. Dwight L. Moody, Senator Depew, Everts, Blaine, Henry George, Frances Willard, Beecher, Garfield and McKinley. A noteworthy feature is the prominence given to Canadians and the elimination of all un-British or anti-Canadian sentiment. Large space is given to the etiquette of official and social life, and this feature will be of special value to those who are rising or hope to rise in the world. A chapter is devoted to the origin of world favorites in song and verse, and other chapters to beautiful thoughts, scriptural proverbs and quotations, rules of order and parliamentary procedure, subjects for discussion, etc. Mr. Cooper, who is also the well-known editor of the Canadian Magazine, appears to have done his work of compilation with care and judgment and has produced a really valuable book which will readily find general acceptance in Canadian homes and libraries.

DUKE AND DUCHESS STILL AT OTTAWA

Companions of St. Michael and St. George Receive Their Honors.

QUEEN'S STATUE UNVEILED AND HULL VISITED

War Medals Bestowed—Duke Dines at Rideau Club—Garden Party at Rideau Hall—Princess Receives Canadian Women's Address—More Smallpox Cases—Shore Line Railway Bought by Russell Sage—A Burglary.

LORD MINTO'S MOVEMENTS.

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—(Special.)—Lord Minto is not to go west with the Duke but will join him duck shooting in Manitoba and go to Halifax to say farewell.

CONFERRING THE C. M. G.'s.

There was an important ceremony this morning conferring the new honors on distinguished Canadians.

The ceremony over the party crossed the river and went to Hull.

UNVEILING THE QUEEN'S STATUE.

At noon the Duke unveiled the statue of Queen Victoria on the Parliament Grounds and later presented the war medals to returned Canadians.

140,000 MEN REVIEWED

British Papers Say Salisbury Not Giving Kitchener Enough Men.
