AFFECTING SCENE WHEN QUEENS MEET

ROME, January 24.—There was an affecting scene at the central station between Queen Helena of Italy and her mother, Queen Milena, of Montenegro, who accompanied by her daughters, Princess Xenia and Princess Vera, reached Rome about nine o'clock on her way from Brindisi to Lyons, France where the Montenegro court is to take up its residence.

King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena, with the Prince Royal Humbert and Princess Yolanda and Mafalda, were at the train to meet the refugees, and under painful circumstances, the King discreetly left the mother and daughter together, both weeping, to console each other.

The Italian Royal children, embraced their grandmothers fervently and the party remained together for several hours. After spending the night in Rome, the members of the Montenegro Royal family continued on a special train to Lyons.

The fact that the King and Queen met the Montenegro Queen is taken as evidence of good faith that Montenegro will cling to the alliance with Italy and other Entente Powers to the end. The Messaggero says:

"At the last moment, Montenegro preferred national honour and accepted the guarantee of Italy and her Allies for national restoration as in the case of Serbia and Belgium."

COUNT BONI AGAIN SEEKS ANNULMENT

Count Boni de Castellane, whose wife was Miss Anna Gould of New York now the Princess, Helga de Saxe-Coburg, Duchess of Talleyrand, has appealed once more to Rome for an annulment of his marriage this time to the Roman Curia. This information was given to the World yesterday by the Rev. Joseph H. McMahon, rector of the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes.

"The Papal Court to which he has appealed this time," said Father McMahon, "has not to my knowledge been called upon to settle a case for three or four centuries."

This information means, if authentic, that the high court of the curia composed of Cardinals sitting in the Segnatura Tribunal, will be asked to judge the validity, under church law, of the Count's marriage in 1895.

Already the court has reviewed once technically, decision of the Rota Tribunal, which three times passed on the case, deciding finally against Count de Castellane.

If the Count obtains an annulment his three children will be illegitimate in the eyes of the Church. The Duchess de Talleyrand is still, by Church law, the wife of the Count; by civil law she is the wife of the Prince de Sagan.

FIFTY THOUSAND HUN/TROOPS ARRIVE AT CONSTANTINOPLE

LONDON, January 24.—Fifty thousand German troops have arrived at Constantinople, according to Saloniki dispatches. British correspondents express the view that the object of this army is not an expedition against Egypt, but to support the authority of the Turkish war minister, Enver Pasha.

Greek reports say that the Turks have recently been reative under the rule of Enver Pasha, and serious plots against him have been discovered, these being suppressed ruthlessly.

"On a single night recently," says one correspondent, "twenty-one Turkish officers, suspected of disaffection, were dropped into the Bosphorus with stones around their necks."

CIVIL PRISONERS NOT OF MILITARY AGE, FREE IN FRANCE AND GERMANY

BERLIN, Jan. 22, via Sayville.—"The German and French Governments," says the Overseas News Agency today, "have agreed to set free all civil prisoners in both countries who are not subject to military service. Under this agreement all men younger than seventeen years and over fifty-five will be released and sent home, also all other men unfit for military duties, and all women.

"The only persons to be retained are those arrested for infractions of the law, or held as hostages, together with those of military age and fit for service."

PRINTING PRESS IN HOME OF COUNTESS SEIZED BY POLICE

LONDON, Jan. 25.—A despatch to the Central News from Dublin says: "The police have raided the house of Countess Markievicz and seized a printing press and type, with which alleged pro-German literature was being printed. The countess is the sister of an Irish baronet, and is married to a Polish nobleman. She was one of the leading sympathizers with James Larkin, head of the Transport Workers' Union, during the street car strike riots in Dublin in 1913, which were led by Larkin. She is also well known for her activities among the poor.

The police have also raided other suspected houses, seizing arms and ammunition."

SMUGGLED OPIUM FROM WINDSOR, ONT.

TOLEDO, Ohio, Jan. 25.—In the arrest last night of Edward Bryant, district federal officers believe they have a clue to the scheme to smuggle large quantities of opium into this country from Windsor, Ont. A code telegram found on Bryant's person following a raid last night indicates, according to the authorities, that Bryant has an accomplice in Windsor smuggling the drug here where Bryant disposes of it.

FORT WILLIAM CANAL CLOSED TO NEUTRAL SHIPPING.

WASHINGTON, January 22.—The British government has prohibited neutral vessels from entering the port of Inverness and the Caledonia canal at Fort William, according to advice received today by the state department from United States Consul General Skinner, at London.

PRESENTATION TO CAPTAIN

LIVERPOOL, January 24.—The government has presented a piece of plate to Captain William Finch, commander of the White Star steamer Arabic, which was sunk by a submarine August 19th last. The mayor of Liverpool, the American consul and Admiral Stibben, participated in the presentation. Admiral Stibben, in a speech, said that Captain Finch's feat in saving four hundred lives in less than ten minutes, was without parallel.

THE ANGENS OF MONS.

Mr. Arthur Machen, a journalist of the forid school, has afforded the country an illustration of the marvelous growth of a baseless superstition (writes a London correspondent). Some months ago Mr. Machen penned an interesting chapter of fiction on the British retreat from Mons. He introduced into his story a powerful description of a vision of angels, clad as bowmen, on horseback, who intervened between pursuers and pursued, and permitted the British to escape. It was a good story, and when men like the Rev. Dr. Horton, and preachers of smaller weight, made the incident a pulp subject, hundreds of people were disposed to sink their incredulity. They had some justification for their belief when news went round that several persons had actually seen the vision. This week there have been two or three such confirmations, one from a colonel, who was said to have "seen it himself." But the colonel's record is really not first hand. It is like the case of the 200,000 Russians in England who were never seen, but heard of by somebody from somebody else. In this instance, Mr. Machen makes no claim that his story is anything more than fiction, but the ball goes on rolling, and Mr. Machen's writings obtain a daily advertisement.
