Britain Starts To Convince Japs Of Defeat In Asia.

By Charles A. Grumich. SINGAPORE, Sept. 13 (AP)—Britain has tackled one of her biggest peacetime jobs in southeast Asia—convincing the Japanese they are being defeated.

Even before Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten, S.E.A.C. commander, received the news of the Japanese surrender on August 15, the British division of psychological warfare was busy with plans to bring the Japanese to their knees.

While the S.E.A.C. commander authorized "the sternest methods" to deal with Japanese "obstinacy, impudence or non-co-operation," he simultaneously was trying persuasively to bring the erstwhile enemy back to the ways of peace.

The navy tonight drew back the curtains of secrecy on the combined Sino-American guerilla force operating behind Japanese lines in China during the Pacific war.

By the end of 1942, Sino-American teams were operating behind Japanese lines in China.

It spread from the border of Indo-China to the northern reaches of the Gobi desert.

Specialized Chinese guerillas, who lived and worked with Saco operatives, had a big hand in training down the size of Japanese forces in China and terrorizing others so much that they soon became afraid to venture from their strongholds except in great strength.

Saco troops worked with other forces and loyal Chinese in reorganizing the Chinese and American guerilla forces in China.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—One month after the end of the Pacific war the American dash into peace looks bold, amazingly swift and so far successful.

Soviet Gov't Lists War Damages Caused By Nazis.

MOSCOW, Sept. 13 (AP)—The Soviet report which charged Russia both in offensive and retreat caused economic losses totaling 678,000,000,000 rubles, said today.

Damage to state enterprises was estimated at 270,000,000,000 rubles, to collective farms at 181,000,000,000 rubles, to rural and urban civilians at 192,000,000,000 rubles, and to public organizations at 19,000,000,000 rubles.

Translated into establishments destroyed these figures mean a total or partial loss of 1,700 towns and more than 70,000 villages.
