

THINK VENISON IS COMING CHEAP MEAT.

DENVER, May 18.—As the result of the high cost of beef, Government experts have investigated elk and deer preserves throughout the country and have decided that there is no reason why venison should not become as cheap and plentiful as mutton. In order to make this possible it will be necessary to amend State laws so as to permit the raising of deer and elk for market purposes. They can be readily raised in nearly every state in the Union, as they are easily controlled and cheaply fed. In Wyoming it has become absolutely necessary for the ranchmen in the northern part of the state to care for the elk in winter to prevent them from starving. The State and the Government, through its Yellowstone Park officials have cooperated for the vast herds of elk in the Jackson's Hole region. It is estimated that there are 30,000 elk in the Yellowstone Park region, constituting the only great herd left. For two or three winters these elk have been few, and have now come to look upon feeding as a matter of course, and State Game Warden Nowlin of Wyoming, who had had the feeding experiment. The last of the great elk herds is becoming rapidly domesticated. Several ranchmen in the Rocky Mountain country have conducted private elk preserves for years. Barrett Littlefield, who lives near Slater, has several hundred elk on his great ranch. Mr. Littlefield's preserve is the largest affair of its kind in the country. He began gathering the elk years ago, when the animals were numerous in Northwestern Colorado. Now they are nearly all gone from the mountains, having drifted north into the Yellowstone Park country, but Mr. Littlefield's herds have increased.

LOBSTERS SCARCE IN NOVA SCOTIA

HALIFAX, May 17.—There have signs of alewives at St. John and western shore points, but no catches of any account have yet been made. Arrivals of fresh fish continue on about an average quantity. There are plenty on the market to supply the demand. Very few dry fish have come on the market yet, and there is not enough in Halifax to supply the demand. The first trip's fish of Lunenburg are reported to have been bought by the largest wholesale houses at a record price. There are no herring arriving and the market is depleted of the fish. Reports from all districts state that lobsters are scarce, and it is likely that this summer's pack will be short.

ENDLESS NOTE CHAIN IN AINOLD GIRL CASE.

PHILADELPHIA, May 15.—Search for the missing Dorothy Arnold has taken a new turn. The country is to be flooded with an endless chain of letters asking information concerning the young woman. Miss Arnold's classmates at Bryn Mawr are promoting the latest endeavor to obtain trace of her whereabouts, believing that she is alive. Within the last week several of the young women who were graduated from Bryn Mawr with Miss Arnold held a meeting and decided to request each of the fifty-odd members of their class to address ten letters to friends directing attention sharply to the case of the missing girl and requesting their co-operation in the search that is being made for her. No set form of letter was provided for. Classmates of Miss Arnold were merely requested to furnish a description of the girl and ask persons connected with the class or Miss Arnold's parents of any clue they might discover. Approximately 500 letters were sent out. The recipient of every letter was requested to address ten additional letters to friends, in turn asking these ten persons to follow the plan for creating an endless chain of missives. Miss Arnold's classmates hope that by this method interest will be stimulated in the search, which at present has practically been abandoned by the police and private detectives.
