SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The following paragraph is from a report of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, convened in the Brick Church, New York City, on Thursday, May 20th, 1869:

"An earnest resolution was adopted urging ministers and Christians to do what is possible to promote the observance of the Sabbath, and arrest in its increasing desecration. A strong protest was issued by both Assemblies against the decoration of soldiers' graves, appointed for the last Sabbath in May, and the second during the Assemblies' meeting, and urging the substitution of another day for the ceremony. The effort was unsuccessful with regard to New York but the day was changed in the adjacent cities of Brooklyn and Jersey City. In New York it fortunately proved a miserable failure, largely because contrary to the conscience of the Christian public. Such action is timely and needful. The Christian religion cannot outlive the Christian Sabbath, against which mighty and numerous foes now conspire."

What about the conscience of the Christian public of Charlottetown? Sept. 14th, 1909.
