Russians Admit Grave Threat To Capital City

Claim, however, Hitler's time table badly knocked out of line by Soviet blows.

MOSCOW, Nov. 28—(Friday)—(AP)—The Russians acknowledged today that massive German assaults are gravely imperiling Moscow's outer defences, but said Hitler's timetable had been knocked badly out of line by Russian blows.

Typical of these counter-thrusts were slaughter of 15,000 Germans in one day's time at three points on the Moscow front and destruction of 105 Nazi tanks by the Soviet air force, the Russians said.

Would conscript Women for some Military Services

Motion in British House of Commons would use women for non-combatant branches.

LONDON, Nov. 27—(C P Cable)—For the first time in Britain's long war history, Parliament will consider conscripting women for non-combatant military service.

Prime Minister Churchill today introduced a motion in the House of Commons seeking enabling legislation for conscription of both woman and man power "still available" for war work.

The motion read:—"In the opinion of this House, for the purpose of securing the maximum national effort in combat of the war and in production, the obligation for national service should be extended to include the resources of womanpower and manpower still available and the necessary legislation should be brought in forthwith."

Japs Impatient To Learn Fate Of Conference

Japanese News Agency reports British preparing invasion of Thailand; Hasty move by Tokyo might touch off conflict with United States.

Sanderson, Canadian Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Nov. 27—(CP)—President Roosevelt was reported to have done some plain talking at a 45-minute White House conference late today with Saburo Kurusu, Japan's special envoy to the United States, and Admiral Kichisaburo Nomura, the Japanese Ambassador.

It was reported tonight that Mr. Roosevelt emphasized the seriousness of the Far East situation and the danger of an all-embracing war in view of reports reaching authoritative quarters in Washington that Japan has been strengthening her forces in French Indo-China within the last few days, perhaps with the object of attacking Thailand as soon as military preparations have been completed.
