He was born in 1823, and succeeded his cousin Sir John Malcolm, the seventh baronet, in 1885. Sir James Malcolm, who was formerly a merchant in Liverpool, and was a Justice of the Peace for the county of Fife succeeded in the baronetcy by his kinsman, Captain James William Malcolm, Havelton Hall, Norwick, formerly of the Royal Pembroke Artillery Militia. Sir James Malcolm will be remembered by many of the readers of THE GUARDIAN. He was a cousin of the late James D. Massey, Esq., of Charlottetown and about twenty-two years ago he visited Prince Edward Island.

AN Ithaca despatch of June 22nd says: The thirty-third annual commencement of Cornell University was held here Thursday in the university armory. President Jacob B. Schurman conferred a total of 439 degrees, including 63 advanced degrees. He also delivered a strong address to an audience which completely filled the armory hall. In his address, President Schurman called attention to the fact that though the United States is a great commercial power this country is intellectually weak. No really great creative minds, he said, have been produced which can claim place with England's great minds such as Darwin and Shakespeare. Any world power influence which is to endure must have intellectual genius. The speaker expressed confidence that American universities would be able to remedy the deficiency.

THE presbytery of Winnipeg met at Dominion City last Monday, the 17th inst., for the induction of the Rev. J. Gillis, of Prince Edward Island, into the pastoral charge of Dominion City, Green Ridge and Langside. Mr. Gillis received a warm greeting and reception from the congregation, as they passed out. He is much encouraged in his work, which he commenced last December, by the good will of the congregation toward him. Thus a good meeting was brought to a close, and the hope is cherished that the happy union formed at it between the pastor and the flock will be of a lasting nature. At the close of the meeting Mrs. Henry Lawson, wife of Mr. Lawson, C. P. R. agent at Dominion City, entertained the members of presbytery at a most excellent dinner.—Manitoba Free Press.

LAST Sunday evening Mr. J. B. McLeod, B. A., of Springton, preached for the Rev. Wm. Wass, in the hall at Vernon River Bridge, to a large congregation. Mr. McLeod, who is a final year student in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, and who has had a brilliant university career is a preacher of great power. His delivery is quiet and impressive and he uses to the best advantage his fine clear voice. Taking his text from the 8th verse of the 4th chapter of Philippians, and particularly the words "Think on these things" the preacher emphasized the supreme importance of thinking. He pointed out that man is the product of his thoughts. "These bodies of ours are not us. It is our thoughts that make us." The necessity of pure, noble, beautiful thoughts was dwelt upon. The speaker admitted that elevating thoughts were not always possible to the natural man but that Jesus Christ came to save the whole man and that He would give us the victory over all our thoughts. The sermon was intently listened to and greatly appreciated by all those who had the privilege of hearing it. Mr. McLeod returned Monday to his home in Springton where he is spending the summer.

THE ENGLISH GENSUS.

The English census returns just coming out show that the city population still gains heavily over the country population. In all England and Wales 77 per cent of the population is in the cities in 1901, and 23 per cent in the rural districts, as against 75 and 25 per cent in 1891. Practically England is now turned into one vast city. Its agriculture is a trifle. Its beautiful fields are largely turned into the parks of rich men, themselves essentially city people, and a great proportion of the persons classed as rural are in one way or another retainers of the rich. The "sturdy yeoman," the man of independent spirit as well as of brawn, has almost disappeared.
