UNEXPECTED DEATH OF MR. W. E. LEONARD

William Ernest Leonard, 48-year old Cornwall farmer died unexpectedly at his home last evening. He was found unconscious in his barn, where he had gone but a short time previously to milk, by his hired man. Medical aid was immediately summoned but the doctor pronounced life extinct. It was believed he had suffered a heart attack. Yesterday Mr. Leonard had worked about his farm as usual and had not complained of illness. His death came as a great shock to his family and to the community where he was a prominent farmer.

Mr. Leonard was born at Cornwall and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Leonard. Surviving are his wife and one brother and two sisters. Mr. Vincent Leonard, Mrs. Frank Macdonald and Mrs. Frank P. MacPhee, all of Charlottetown. The funeral will be held from his late residence Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock to St. Dunstan's Basilica. Interment will be in the Roman Catholic Cemetery.
