COCHRANE, Ont., Aug. 12—(CP)—Caroline has gone home to her Eskimo village on Hudson Bay, all fitted out with a new heel and a new set of teeth. Caroline is a young Eskimo woman who was brought to Lady

Minto hospital here last year from Port Harrison, on Hudson Bay. Her heel had been frozen during a long walk and had to be replaced by surgery. Hospital officials also found her teeth in very bad condition and they were all extracted and replaced with a new set. Her expenses were paid by a

grant from the department of Indian affairs and by public contributions through the local weekly newspaper, the Cochrane Northland Post. By the time she was ready to return home—to be married—she had learned enough English to be able to carry on some conversation. But the hospital staff never

learned any more of her name than "Caroline."

Mystery Lake In Manitoba Solved

FLIN FLON, Man., Aug. 11 (CP)—An old Indian legend that brought about the name of Mystery Lake in northern Manitoba has been solved, according to prospectors returning here. In the legend an Indian youth is said to have returned to camp one day 26 years ago and told his tribesmen that his father was missing. The father never returned, so the lake in the area became known to the tribe as Mystery Lake. It was on the shore of this lake, situated north of Thicket Narrows on the Hudson Bay railway, that

prospectors searching for precious metals recently discovered a skeleton revealed in its grave by water that ate away the earth covering it. Bones protruding from the mound of earth were noticed by a group of prospectors standing on the shore of the lake and when the mound was examined it revealed the skeleton of a man. A long knife carved from a saw blade, its point bent, was held between the spine's vertebrae. Also found in the grave alongside the body was a pipe carved out of stone, a comb, and a short section of a file believed to have been used by the man for scratching flint to start a fire.
