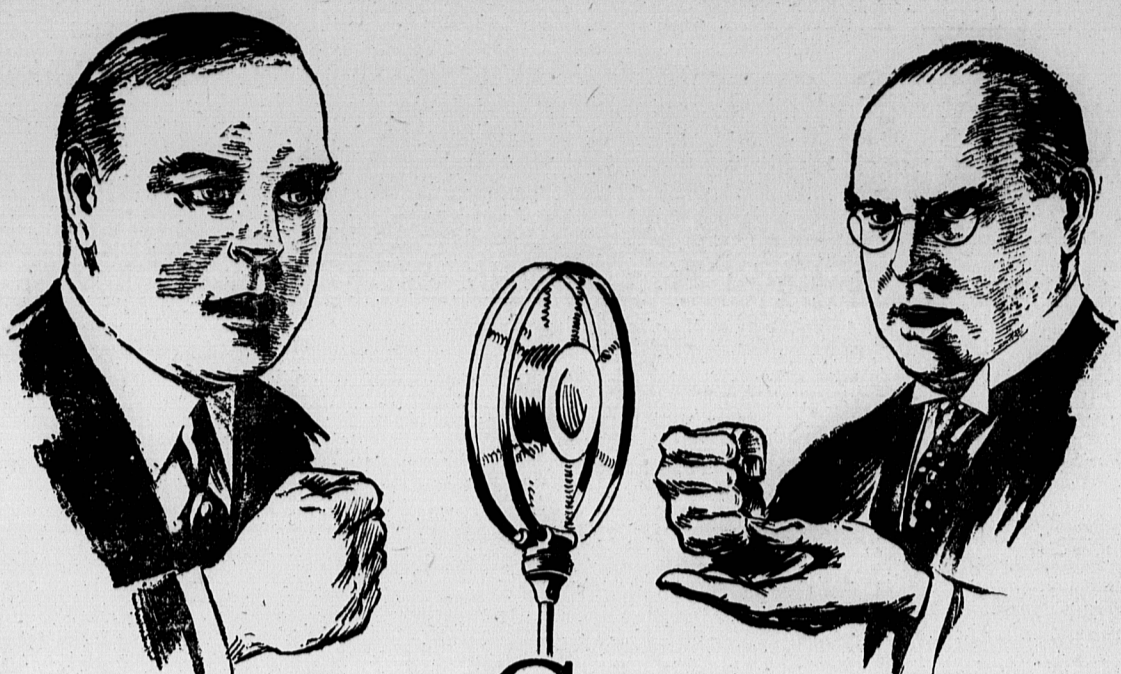
Mr. W. L. MacKinnon of Bay Fortune, was a visitor to our town on the 3rd.

Mr. Ted Ellis spent the week end in Charlottetown.

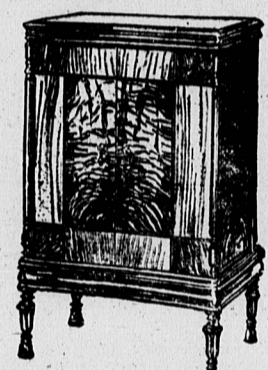

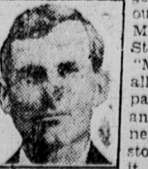

BLACKPOOL, Lancashire, England July 9.—Six boys of a party of ninety one bathing on the sea coast between St. Ann's and Blackpool were drowned today. The boys coming from Farnworth had been camping in the neighbourhood and were taken out for a swim by their principal teacher. Several got into difficulties and their call for help brought assistance. Two boys were rescued when the others came out of the sea. The teacher called the roll, but found that six lads were missing. The bodies later were brought ashore, but artificial respiration which was tried for over an hour was unsuccessful.

MR. ISAAC LAIRD.
