ONE OF EDISON'S GREAT INVENTIONS.

Everybody in these days is familiar with the cinematograph, as it is called in England, or the moving picture, as it is commonly known in America. But comparatively few are aware of the vast development of this enterprise or the immense influence it wields for good or ill in the world today.

every other country there is an operator with his camera ready to go out on instructions from Paris. This will give some idea of what one French house is doing in the moving picture line.

In England more people go week by week to the moving picture houses than go to the theatres, and both in the old world and the new the patrons include not only adults but children in vast numbers. The number of the little ones who are receiving impressions in these places of amusement and entertainment at the most impressionable period of their lives, the formative period, too, is almost incalculable, and the effect upon them for good or ill or both for good and ill is a matter which parents, guardians, preachers, teachers and moralists ought deeply to ponder.

Edison claims for this great invention that "it will wipe out narrow minded prejudices which are founded on ignorance, it will create a feeling of sympathy and a desire to help the down-trodden people of the earth and it will give new ideals to be followed." This is the brighter side. And there is hope from the formation of a National Board of Censorship in New York, composed of public-spirited men and women, formed for the purpose of eliminating improper or demoralizing films.

London has 200 moving picture theatres, New York 450, Chicago 310, Philadelphia 160, and other cities and towns throughout the world have them in varying proportions. Edison's royalty on his invention yields him \$8,000 a week, or at the rate of \$416,000 a year. In the United States and Canada the middlemen pay to the manufacturers \$9,000,000 a year for films, and rent them for \$18,000,000 a year to the theatre managers.

Edison is reported to be giving his attention to a combination of the phonograph with the moving pictures so that the story can be told at the same time to the eye and the ear as in the regular drama. Very probably this will in the end be achieved, but it may take years to perfect it. In the meantime Shakespeare's plays are being rehearsed and photographed for reproduction in dumb show on the moving picture screens. Ten or twelve leading episodes from each play are selected, and the less essential parts omitted, so that the principal part of the plot and development of say, Hamlet or Othello, can be given in twenty minutes or less.

Moving pictures have obtained a very wide patronage in France. The leading French film manufacturing company, says the American Magazine, has 5,000 employees over most of the globe, collecting and rehearsing subjects and obtaining pictures. It has offices and manufactures in New York and Jersey City, while the main offices are in Paris, with branches in France, Spain, Russia, Italy, Germany, India and Japan. In almost

upon. Indeed it is quite possible that this question may yet form a clear line of distinction in policy between our two parties—something that has been for a good while wanting.

In the meantime there has been a pretty general lining up of the Conservative and protectionist press in Canada against reciprocity in any form, while the leading Liberal journals in a milder fashion seem to favor some modified form of freer exchange of the natural products of the two countries. No doubt we shall have more pronounced opinions from the Liberal papers if and when the Government makes up its mind to accept such terms as may be agreed

Between those who favor and those who oppose the principle of reciprocal trade there is another and moderate class who would take no definite action at the present time but await developments. These persons argue with some show of reason that the true theory in fiscal matters is for the Dominion to make a tariff

suitable for its own people and the Republic to do the same, that as the American tariff is much higher than ours, it is for our neighbors to reduce it, which would operate to increase mutual trade across the border, and that as the United States, because of her growth in manufactures and population must shortly become an extensive importer of such products as she has long exported, the American tariff must be reduced to the level of our own.

It is quite clear that there is a strong and growing demand for tariff reduction across the border, and this and the willingness of the Washington authorities to negotiate afford some indication that if reasonable terms of agreement cannot now be reached, we may count confidently that we stand to gain by waiting. We do not think it likely that our Government will sacrifice Canadian interests at the present in over-eagerness to please our neighbors, and therefore the great body of Canadians are resting pretty easy on the question.

There is this point to be noted, however, that always when tariffs or trade treaties are being considered the manufacturers and protected interests are on the alert. They are especially so at the present time. So are the western grain-growers, the lumbermen and others, while nothing seems to be heard from the farmers, stock raisers and market gardeners of the Maritime Provinces. Have they no voice, or no one to speak for them? Surely they have interests that are worth looking after whether they think so or not.

SHOOTING AT SPRINGHILL, N. S.

SPRINGHILL, N. S., Oct. 17.—A shooting and stabbing affray occurred in Springhill last night, whereby two young men received serious wounds, which in one case may prove fatal. A man, named McKay, in altercation with an Indian, received a wound in the back from some sharp instrument. The cut penetrated his lung.

When nearing disputants he saw the Italian draw a revolver and fire at the other. There were five shots fired, one of which hit Crumie on the left cheek bone.

CHAMPION IS KILLED.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Oct. 17.—Walter A. Hurtz, who shot and killed Stanley Ketchell, the world's middleweight champion yesterday, was captured today at the home of Thomas Haggard, one mile from Niangua, (Mo.) Hurtz was taken to Webster County jail at Marshallfield, where he is being closely guarded.

Hurtz asserts that Ketchell made insulting remarks to Goldie Smith, the cook employed at the farm. Words passed between Ketchell and him and he ordered the prize-fighter to throw up his hands. When the champion refused to do this, he was so frightened, knowing that Ketchell carried a revolver, that he fired.
