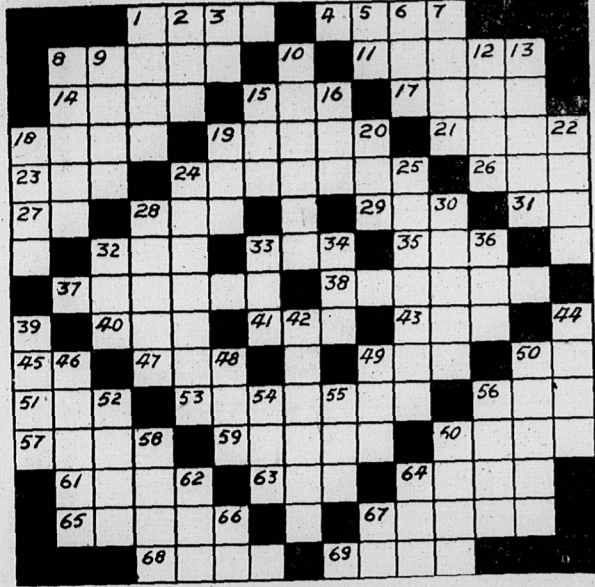

NEW YORK, March 27.—A treaty of peace was signed today between the On Leong and Hip Sing tong, officially ending the warfare which has caused the death of numerous Chinese in different parts of the country during the past few months.

soaked every week or so through out the warm weather with a solution of one of the coal tar disinfectants or a special paint made by diluting either one of the coal tar disinfectants or crude carbolic, one part, to four or five parts of coal oil or fuel oil.

When the mites are known to be present a thorough house cleaning is in order. Remove all droppings and old-nesting material, scrape and sweep out every particle of dirt and burn it. Sweep down the walls and with the aid of a spray pump saturate every crack in the house and the fixtures with a good strong disinfectant solution.

The control of lice is much easier, for while there are a number of different species, the same methods of control are satisfactory for all. The natural method of control is the dust bath; more effective if a little powder of sulphur is added. However, there are all ways some birds in a flock that will not use the bath, so it is safest if lice are noticed, to treat each bird individually. At the Central Experimental Farm blue ointment is used, a little being rubbed beneath the wings and below the vent, to kill the lice and any that may hatch.

For setting hens, depend on the dust and sulphur rubbed into the plumage, as the ointment will not only kill the lice but the germs in the eggs as well.

Prince Of Wales Off On Six Months Tour

LONDON, March 27.—Two hundred cases and trunks, constituting the luggage of the Prince of Wales and his entourage were stored away aboard the H. M. S. Repulse, at Portsmouth today in readiness for their departure tomorrow on a six-month tour through South Africa and South America.

THE STIMULATING NITRATES.

Nitrate of soda is the speed merchant of the garden and one of the cheapest of commercial fertilizers. It is a great stimulant and is a standby in the garden stock room. A supply should always be on hand. It is the great fertilizer where quick growth of foliage is desired and therefore it is unusually valuable for vegetables, the leaves of which are the edible portions. It promotes growth and gives color to the foliage. As an experiment drop a lump of nitrate on the lawn. In a short time a heavy turf of dark blue green grass will rise above the surrounding lawn, just as cow droppings in old pastures always show the circle of extra luxuriant herbage about them due to the fertilizing elements.

While nitrate is a powerful and quick acting fertilizer, it needs to be used with care. Used in too great quantity it will injure or even kill a plant. In case of doubt it is best to use it as a liquid fertilizer. The quantity used safely is a scant tablespoonful to a square yard and the same amount to a gallon of water. A teaspoonful is sufficient to scatter about plants of large growth such as a cabbage or an egg plant. As the nitrate is received it looks like dirty rock salt. Lumps should be pounded fine until it is the consistency of coarse salt and can be sprinkled thinly. It should be scattered at least two inches from the stems of plants to avoid burning them.

Lime is an accompaniment of nitrates as a fertilizer, using the lime in alternate years, or occasionally in the fall after a spring dressing of nitrate but never at the same time. Lime aids in nitrification and liberates plant food held in combinations which are insoluble and not readily available. Nitrates furnish the plant the necessary supply of nitrogen. While nitrate of soda is the concentrated and most easily obtainable supply of this necessary element, nearly all fertilizers contain a percentage of it. The ammonia in fermenting manure is a nitrogen compound and one of the valuable

soluble. It is not a fertilizer to be applied when the seed is sown or before it, but is to be applied to the growing crop. As it dissolves very readily, it leaches out of the soil only where the roots are ready to receive it. As in other fertilizers the plant can use only a certain quantity and too heavy a dressing is not only a waste but often harmful.

SUPPLEMENTING SHORT PASTURES

(Experimental Farms Note)

Cattle on pasture lose flesh, and milk cows yield less milk, during mid-summer. While flies and heat are contributing factors, the principal cause of this is short pastures. Therefore the scant mid-summer pastures should be supplemented with grain and either green feed or summer silage, or both. The cows will drop so badly in milk yield that they cannot easily be brought back to profitable production when stable-feeding starts in the fall.

Grain feeding is advisable with heavy milking cows. Cows milking twenty pounds, or over, should receive one pound of grain for every six to eight pounds of milk which they produce. Pasture grass con-
