"The Great Moment" A Triumph of Film Art

Electric Power Plant For Whole Island Still a Possibility

"The realization of the proposed two-million dollar electric light and power plant for the province, a bill of incorporation of which was put through with some alterations at the last session of the Provincial Legislature, is still quite feasible provided the time limit for the building of the plant is extended," said Mr. W. J. O'Leary of Montreal, one of the principal promoters of the scheme, in an interview with The Guardian representative yesterday. Mr. O'Leary is on a brief visit to his brother, Bishop O'Leary, and other friends in the city, and is stopping with His Lordship at the Palace.

Several minor alterations made in the bill of incorporation have not met with the approval of the promoters, who feel that when in operation their plan will be of inestimable benefit to the whole province. They are however, prepared to accept any reasonable terms on condition that they be given sufficient time to build and install the enormous amount of machinery necessary to insure successful operation. "The building of the special steam turbines required would be a two-year job," said Mr. O'Leary. They could not think of getting under way in a year or two years, in accordance with the terms of the bill. This is really the only obstacle in the way, he believed; and if at the next legislative session the time limit is extended the work could be started without further loss of time.

The proposed electric light and power plant, details of which appeared in the press last year, would in all probability be established at Charlottetown. The operation of the special steam turbines would greatly economize on the coal required, which could be shipped direct from the mines. It is believed by the promoters that electric power could be generated on so large a scale as practically to eliminate competition and so cheaply that every part of the province could be supplied at a satisfactory rate.

Mr. O'Leary who has achieved great success as an electrical engineer in Montreal is remaining in the province about ten days.

STEAMER IMO TOTAL WRECK

HALIFAX, Dec. 26.—The former Belgian Relief ship Imo, which was in collision with the Mont Blanc in the Narrows on the morning of December 6th, 1917, has come to grief. As the Governore, which was the name given her following the disaster, the Imo was off the East Falkland Islands early this month and it is a strange coincidence that the Imo should come to grief on the same date four years after the Halifax disaster. The ship was acting as a mother ship for a whaling expedition at the time she was lost.

The Governore was under the Norwegian flag and left Standerfjord on October 26th, for the South Shetland Islands. She arrived at Montevideo and sailed from there on November 24th.

The ship had an interesting career. Launched at Belfast in 1889 for the White Star Line she was named the Runio and for a time was one of that line's big fleet. Later the name was changed to that of the Tampicari, then to Imo, and finally Governore. She registered 5,013 gross and 3,161 net tons, and was built by Harland and Wolff, Ltd. Her dimensions were: Length, 430.7 feet; beam 45.2 feet; depth, 30.3 feet.

The Imo will always be remembered by Halifaxians. It was while outward bound from Bedford Basin, where she had been for examination that the ship was in collision with the munition loaded Mont Blanc, inward bound for examination.

That collision occurred shortly before nine o'clock and a few minutes after that hour the cargo of T. N. T. in the holds of the Mont Blanc, which had drifted toward the Halifax shore, just south of where Old Pine Hill stood, blew up.

While the Mont Blanc drifted toward the Halifax shore after the disaster, the Imo, badly damaged in the collision was beached on the Dartmouth shore and received greater damage by the explosion.

In the ensuing litigation the Nova Scotia Supreme Court held the Mont Blanc solely responsible, but the Supreme Court of Canada and the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council decided that both ships were to blame.
