Wills Wealth to Animal Society

NEW YORK, Jan 16.—Dislike for human society and affection for animals has led Mrs. Sidmon McHie, of number 18 West Fifty-third street, to make a will in which she will leave all her considerable fortune to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals for a hospital for animals. It will be the largest of its kind in the world, set in wide grounds somewhere in the suburbs of New York.

The hospital is to be known as the Isabel McHie Memorial and in it will be a bust of herself in marble on a pedestal, which will contain her ashes. Over the door will be carved the words that explain her purpose in making this unusual gift.—"The more I saw of people, the more I thought of dogs."

There was little to indicate a tendency to misanthropy in Mrs. McHie as she smilingly discussed her will in her home today, she told of the inscription on the bust and of how she arrived at her decision after long deliberation, but regarding what had made her so dislike humans, she even contemplated the destruction after her death of her pets and a painting of herself by a French artist, she was mute. Inquiries as to the size of her bequest she also turned away with a smile.

"Just say it is all I have in the world, or will have from trusts that will come to me," she said. "Even my jewels will be sold and the money given to a memorial fund."

Mrs. McHie is tall, of a rather stately dignity and charm, of a manner shown in the full length portrait by Francois Flameng, which hangs in her drawing room.

"I can do anything with animals," she said, "and mine have always been so well trained that I could take them to a friend's home for a bride, and know that they would not be an annoyance. Indeed," she laughed, "I have been told that it was a pity I could not have trained children, they would have been so well mannered."

Mrs. McHie said she had thought of doing something of the kind for years, and she thought at her age it was time she made her will.

NEW USE FOR X-RAYS

Travel Craze On Increase

MONTREAL, Jan. 16.—Domestic and foreign travel for the coming year is liable to break all records according to Ralph E. Towle head of the American Express Travel Department. "The return of the nations of the world to peaceful pursuits once more permits the many tens of thousands of travellers to again roam the world," said Mr. Towle. "While the cost of transportation has increased twofold the purchasing power of the dollar abroad has more than doubled. The tales brought back by returning tourists this past year of the bargains to be had on the continent for American dollars has done much to stimulate foreign travel and create inquiries even at this early date for the year's travels."

In 1922 approximately 200,000 travelled across the Atlantic and spread out over the continent. It is safe to say that each tourist spent on an average of \$1,000, or a total of \$200,000,000. This year with increased facilities and better conditions here and abroad, we look for at least a 20 per cent. increase in these figures.

Ten years ago that branch of travel known as a cruise was still in its infancy. Last year the seven seas were full of cruising ships and there seemed to be an inexhaustible supply of travellers demanding space on board these ships. Our last cruise to leave in 1922 on the Laconia, bound around the world, is reported from Japan, where the Japanese people gave the 450 members of the cruise a royal reception.

The first cruise we will send out this year will be to the Mediterranean for 65 days and will leave New York February 7 on the Mauritania. Our annual cruise to South America will sail as usual and we are now at work arranging other cruises for the latter part of 1923 and the early part of 1924.

Where do all the people come from? I have been asked this question many times. The passenger list of the Laconia world cruise is an answer to that, as it shows that out of 450 aboard 440 came from 37 States in the United States and ten from different parts of Europe, Mexico and Canada.

So you see the travel spirit is pretty widely distributed. In forming an opinion of the travel business for 1923 I have based it upon reports from our 32 branch offices in the United States and those we maintain for the convenience of our patrons in the principal countries of the world. I feel justified in predicting that 1923 will be a banner travel year.

A PHOSPHORESCENT LAKE

Skull Is Fractured Falls Off R.R. Coach

MONTREAL, Jan 16.—Charles C. Divine, aged 36, 178 LeBreton street, fell a distance of 20 feet from a railway coach to the bed of the Rideau canal at the G. T. R. swing bridge, Saturday morning night. Dr. F. W. McKinnon is attending him.

The unfortunate man, employed as yard foreman, was riding on the step of the passenger coach during shunting operations with the intention of throwing the switch after the train passed. He lost his footing on the icy step and crashed to the canal bed below.

W. P. Hurley, 62 Elm street, brakeman on the train, missed the bridge, and went back to investigate. He found his injured mate lying below the bridge, and bleeding. Rushing back to the yard office, Hurley telephoned for an ambulance, and then clambered down the side of the canal bank to the assistance of the injured man. Divine was taken to St. Luke's Hospital, where every medical assistance was given.

Charles C. Divine has been in the employ of the G. T. R. for nearly 20 years. Fortunately he is only of slight build, as if he had been of heavy build he would have been killed outright by the fall, medical men say. When the injured man recovered consciousness in St. Luke's Hospital he wanted to be taken to his home, Divine, who saw four years' service with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, is a married man with a family.

A WASHINGTON MONUMENT

It Was Built by Money Raised by a Public Lottery.
One of the greatest American monuments to the memory of George Washington was built by lottery. The lottery plan for raising money, though not under the ban of public opinion and generally considered a reprehensible practice was looked upon as legitimate and respectable by the most reputable class of citizens a century ago.

That monument which was raised to the memory of George Washington by the sale of lottery tickets and the offer of dazzling prizes is the tall column which dominates a very exclusive and aristocratic part of Baltimore and which in fair weather may be seen from a considerable distance. Besides being one of the show places of Baltimore, it is one of the imposing monuments of the United States. The view from the balcony, which is built close to the top of the shaft, and just below, where stands a figure of Washington, is far sweeping, especially bayward. The cornerstone of the monument was laid with elaborate ceremonies July 4, 1815, and its crowning feature, the statue of Washington, was set in place in 1829. The Washington monument lottery was authorized by the Maryland legislature Jan. 10, 1810. That act was entitled "An act respecting a memorial or statue to the memory of George Washington," and under its provisions the applicants were required to give bond for the proper conduct of the lottery and were required to finish up the affairs of the lottery in five years' time and a race of ground in Baltimore was allotted for the proposed memorial.—Washington Star.

AIR SERVICE OFF GOVERNMENT ORDER FINED FOR ALLOWING A STILL ON PREMISES
The trial of three brothers, Napoleon and Patrick Graveline, of Aymer, charged with the theft of two hens, the property of Frank Boucher, a conductor on the Hull Electric Railway, was held in the court of Judge Roland Milne on Saturday afternoon. The Gravelines were charged with the theft of the hens, which were valued at \$200 and costs. The property of the Gravelines was returned to the Hull Electric Railway Company for power development purposes. McGeoy affirmed that the shack where the liquor was distilled was not on his property but it was established in the evidence that the property is still under his control. The accused paid the fine. The charge was preferred by officers of the Customs and Excise Department.

LONDON, Jan 16.—Some confusion is being caused by the action of the German Government in refusing to allow British commercial aircraft over a certain size to fly over her borders, as this action means the closing down of the aerial mail and passenger service now running between London and Cologne every day. This has been a popular mode of travel and lately the rush has been so great that two air liners had to be put into service instead of one. Under the Treaty of Versailles, Germany has the right to ban foreign aircraft after January 1, 1923, and she is taking advantage of this provision.

ONE BRITISH CONCERN, IT IS UNDERSTOOD, has come to an understanding with the Germans by which they will run their 10-seater machines right through to Berlin from London in the coming year.
