A NEW PHILOSOPHY AS TO COURTING.

Courting is almost as old as the race, but with changing methods from generation to generation and with large variety in the same age and country. There have been long courtships and short ones both in ancient and modern times. Jacob was an energetic wooer and kissed his cousin Rachel the first time they met, though afterward he had to work hard for seven years before he got possession. A less ardent Sandy in more recent times, as is related, courted his not reluctant Jean for seven years before his courage rose to the height of osculation. These are extreme cases, no doubt.

And there are many and diverse opinions as to the comparative merits and desirability of long and short courtships. Much might be said as to the propriety of prolonging that most delightful period in the lives of men and women, and much also on the other side. Into that we need not now inquire. Sometimes a man wants a wife and does not want to wait. He has neither the time nor the disposition for a long courtship. The case is not altogether exceptional. SENATOR ROSS AS AN ATTI-TUNNEL MAN.

Hon William Ross, Senator of Halifax, when in attendance at the Maritime Board of Trade, took it upon himself to denounce the Tunnel scheme and to somewhat defiantly assert that this Province will never get it. He is an old man now, and as such would be entitled to respect, were it not that he has developed a measure of garrulity that is very wearisome to almost every meeting he attends, and a manner at times particularly dictatorial and offensive.

Still it must be admitted that he speaks with some sort of authority as a member of the Liberal party. He was one of the two members representing Nova Scotia in the Mackenzie Government, and was appointed to the Senate in 1907 by the Laurier Government. His special mission to the Maritime Board seems to have been to give rather blatant expression to the official hostility in the party to the Tunnel, which its opponents here lack the courage to express on the home ground. He is safe in Halifax and the Senate. The people of Prince Edward Island are powerless to effectually resent his wordy ebullitions, and for that matter care little what he says or thinks. He is a little pop-gun shot and rebound to cover. Its only effect will be to injure here in the

public mind, those on whose behalf he spoke.
