### DEHORNING CALVES

Young calves can best be dehorned when from three to five days old, or as soon as the small buttons, which later become horns, can be felt. Clip the hair away from around them and smear a little vaseline around each. Then moisten one end of a stick of caustic potash and rub it on the spot until the skin bleeds slightly. The vaseline protects the skin around the future horns, but care must be taken not to have too much water on the caustic potash or it will run down the head and take off the hair; or, worse yet get in the animal's eyes. Also, always be sure to wrap a piece of paper or something around the stick to protect the hands of the operator.

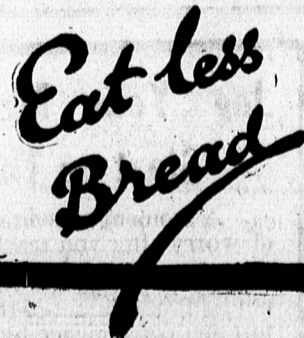
