Davidson, 432507, 49th Batt., a prisoner of war in Germany, have received from home through the Canadian Red Cross of London, acknowledgment with thanks for the parcels he has received through the Red Cross. The teachers subscribe a certain amount monthly, which is sent to the Canadian Red Cross.

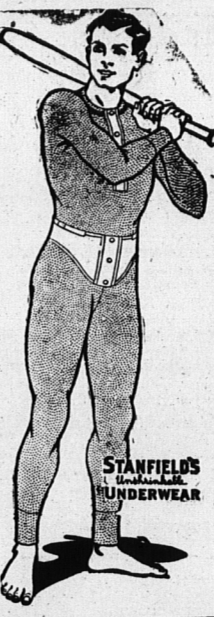

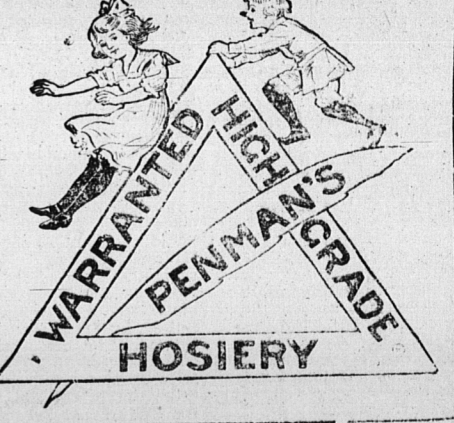

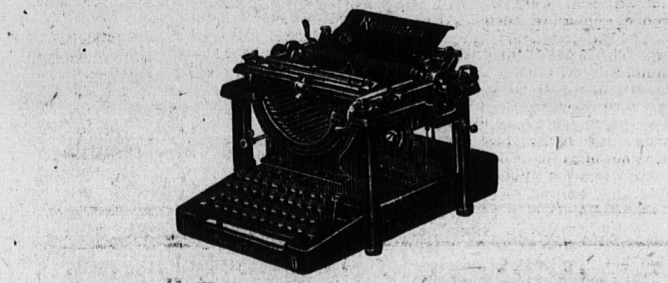
