Following service with the Ontario Forestry Branch, he joined Trans-Canada Air Lines in 1939 as radio operator and during the war he spent five years with the Department of Transport. Upon his return to T. C. A. in 1946, he became operator of the trans-Atlantic ground station at Moncton. He moved to Winnipeg in 1947 as communications instructor, the position he held at the time of his present appointment.

Mrs. Alexander, a remarkable woman, was about 80 when she died of bomb shock in 1940. Her \$3,000,000 (\$12,000,000) were inherited from her father, Isaac Singer, the American Sewing Machine manufacturer who became a British subject.

ton of London, stepped in after a wartime mine detector disclosed that the stately Grosvenor Square mansion in which the secretive old lady lived is honeycombed with chambers and unsuspected cavities behind thick masonry.

Leading the search is an elderly solicitor, Barry Cohen, who devoted a good deal of his time to drawing up wills for Mrs. Alexander.

Cohen, acting for unnamed "interested parties," recalls that he drew up "four or five wills" and any number of codicils during the last 20 years. But when the estate came up for disposition the only will that could be found was one in 1939.

The estate, believed to consist largely of shares of the Singer Manufacturing Company and stock in Wood Products Enterprises, is being managed under the provisions of this old will. Names of the beneficiaries are not to be found on any public records available in London, but Cohen insists that the will could have disposed specifically of only one-sixth of the vast fortune.

Calling in the clairvoyant, Cohen explained, was merely an impulse to try anything, and he said

he believes some progress has been made. Mrs. Alexander's old house is occupied now by the busy Ministry of Town and Country Planning, which does not care to have its walls bashed in in a search for secret chambers. However, the Ministry did permit the use of one of the army's mine detectors. A sergeant went over the mahogany, which does not care to have any panelling with the device.
