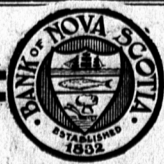

Mr. C. B. Chappell, the architect who made the original plans for the Asylum annex which Mr. Lowe claims were erroneous and were the cause of the dispute which ended in his being deprived of the contract, is now giving evidence.
