**BEET SUGAR.**

The production of sugar from beets has become one of the great industries of the world. This is almost wholly the growth of the past fifty years. Before that date sugar was almost exclusively produced from the sugar cane of tropical islands and countries. The production of sugar from beets when it was first entered upon was encouraged and stimulated by a system of bounties until in 1901 the total production of beet sugar reached 6,000,000 tons, wholly grown in regions where sugar was not before produced. In fact the production of beet sugar is now more than twice as great as that of cane sugar, six million compared with less than three million tons. Germany produces two million tons yearly, an amount equal to 72 pounds per head of her entire population. Austria and France each produce yearly more than a million tons and Russia nearly a million tons. From the Old World the industry has spread to the United States where it is being rapidly developed, there being over sixty beet sugar factories there, some of them operating on a large scale.

As is well known certain soils and certain climates are better adapted than others for the production of the sugar beet at its best, that is a beet containing the largest amount of sweet or sugar. It has been found that our Dominion in many parts has all the conditions necessary to an extensive and flourishing industry. A. Callaghan of this city has taken a deep interest in testing the fitness of our Island soil and climate for the growth of the sugar beet in its perfection and with most remarkable results. Last spring he distributed some sugar beet seed of the Villoria variety to various localities in the Island where beets were grown therefrom and specimens of the beets grown were sent to the chemical division of the Experimental Farm at Ottawa. The beets were grown respectively at St. Dunstan's College grounds, Campbellton, West River, Freeand, Foxby River and Port Hill. Of these the best results were shown from the beets grown at St. Dunstan's, which yielded 20.49 per cent of sugar juice and 24.23 per cent of solids in the juice. The average of the six samples was 16.93 of sugar juice and 20.54 of solids.

These are very remarkable results as compared with the best produced in other countries as will appear from the following figures showing the saccharine value of the beets there grown. In California at the great Spreckels factory the percentage of sugar in the juice of the beets was 16; on the Pacific coast 14.72 per cent; in New York 16, Nebraska 14, Colorado 15, Utah 14.5 and in Germany 12.56 per cent. It will be seen that the average of the Prince Edward Island beets tested very much higher than those of Germany, the greatest beet sugar country in the world. It may be impossible to overrate the result of this test. There are millions and tens of millions of capital standing ready to exploit the sugar beet industry and that capital is seeking the country where the sugar beet can be produced at its best and most economically. This is by the same law that has erected enormous steel works at Pittsburg, Sydney and the Soo. Capital always seeks the point where production is cheapest.

It would seem that Mr. Callaghan has practically demonstrated that our Island is unexcelled, if indeed it does not excel all others as having a soil and climate adapted for sugar beet production. This may be mean great things in the way of increased value to be derived from our farms, increased value of farms, and increased prosperity generally.

We have not advanced the price of our tobaccos. Amber smoking tobacco, Bobs, chewing tobaccos are the same size and price to the consumer as formerly. We have also extended the time for the redemption of Snowshoe Tags to January 1st, 1907.

erally. It may mean much in keeping our young men at home on the farm. This touches a point where we have made our greatest losses in the past. It has been estimated that to raise one young man to man's estate, feed, clothe, educate and fit him for the battle of life costs \$1,000. This class of costly material we have been exporting to the value of many millions and getting no return. They have gone to give their manhood, their energy and intelligence to build up and enrich other lands—in many cases a foreign land. May it not be that by building up a great sugar industry in our midst our young men may be kept at home, the millions they are worth retained, while at the same time the thousands of dollars sent abroad yearly to purchase sugar for home consumption may be kept in the country? This would be a consummation devoutly to be wished.

By a bill which has recently passed both Houses of Congress the salaries of United States Judges have been substantially increased. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court who now receives a salary of \$10,500 will hereafter receive \$13,000 while the salaries of the Associate Judges of the same Court will be advanced from \$10,000 to \$12,500 each. The salaries of United States Circuit Court Judges are advanced from \$8,000 to \$7,000 each and of the Judges of the District Courts from \$5,000 to \$8,000 each. In Canada the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court receives \$3,000 and the Associate Judges \$7,000 each.

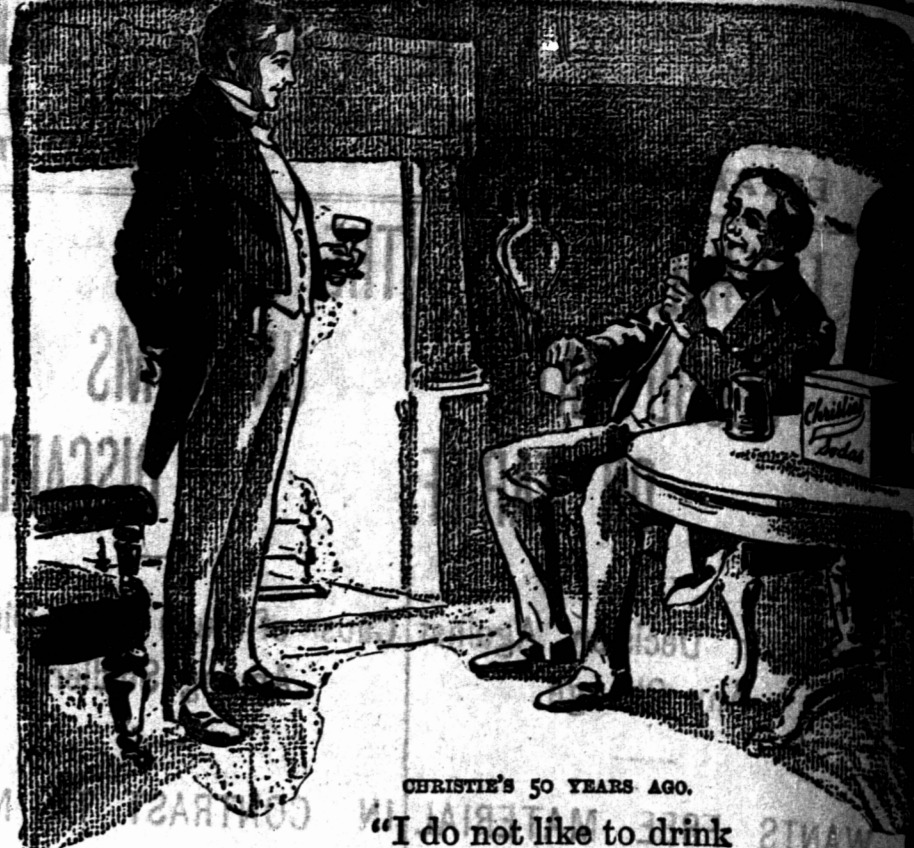
