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Notes by the Way

EXHIBITION Week seems like "Old Home Week" of some years ago, there are so many old-timers round about you run up against them at every corner.

The passing of Lord Haldane of Cloan removes one of the most striking personalities of his day and generation. He shared with Lord Balfour the distinction of winning the highest honors in two spheres—the philosophical and the political.

In the political world Lord Haldane played a most conspicuous double part. In the Liberal Government in 1905-12, he was Secretary of State for War, and it was during his tenure that the British army was completely reorganized.

In 1912 Lord Haldane was appointed Lord High Chancellor, the post next to that of the King himself. He held the position until 1915 when the Ministry was reconstructed owing to the war.

What are drivers of jitneys termed? You cannot call them chauffeurs, which is applicable to the drivers of private cars.

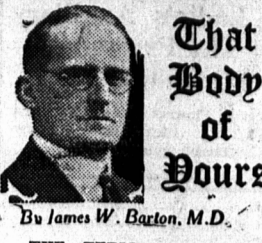
