James Hughes, Robert McGuirk and Philip Coyle directed the reception. Mr. Ed. Byrne acted as chairman. Addresses of welcome and farewell were delivered by Mr. James Hughes and Mr. Edward Hughes, of Dromore. At the conclusion of the entertainment a purse containing a large sum of money was presented to the priest. Father O'Brien addressed the assemblage in the form of a description of the Northwest, especially that portion situated on Puget Sound. He exhorted the people of Dromore to attend to the education of their children more strictly, telling them not to send their boys and girls into this most advanced and progressive world uneducated. He said it was a very unjust and a great outrage to send a boy or girl into this world of enlightenment and mental activity unable to sign their name. sacrifice a dollar, prepare your boys and girls to take a place alongside the men and women of the great American and Canadian nations. You, fathers and mothers of Prince Edward Island, possess the best that God in the world, therefore, give them what God intends for them, an education, spiritual and intellectual. DIVORCE HABIT GROWING FAST
Great Increase of Cases in London

LONDON, Oct. 15.—The number of divorce cases set for hearing in London in 1914 was 2,633; in 1915, 4,119; and at the present rate of going the total for 1919 will be close to 6,000. The increase is mainly due to the new law under which "poor men's divorces" are made possible by a low rate of fees, these fees having heretofore been prohibitive for all except the well-to-do. The vast bulk of these are directly attributable to the war, but there are evidences of a growth of the divorce habit which hardly makes it probable that the pre-war figures will ever again be touched.

NEWS OF SPORT

An intermediate football team is being formed by the Abegweits with the intention of further encouraging the game. Practises will be held each evening at five o'clock at the A.A.A. Grounds.

No date has yet been definitely set for the next game between the Abegweits and St. Dunstan's.

It is understood that a game will take place on Saturday afternoon at the A. A. A. grounds between the "Saints" and ex-Saints". This should prove quite an attraction as there are quite a number of former students of St. Dunstan's who can certainly play the game. Perhaps they can teach the younger generation of kickers a thing or two? Some of the fans would like to know anyhow.

That Rugby is just as popular as ever after the war was well demonstrated when the old rivals, Dalhousie and Wanderers, met in the opening game of the series with about 2,000 people at the Wanderers grounds at Halifax on Monday. The Juniors played first, and Dalhousie was credited with a victory, two tries to a goal. The Wanderers, however, protested on the ground that the referee misinterpreted the rules, and that the real score should be 5 to 3 in their favor. The Wanderers also made a protest against Dalhousie for playing Abegweits, who had engaged in professional baseball this summer.

L. B. Gastonguay, the representative of the M. P. B. of the A. A. U., informed them after the game that they had no right to play him.

Dalhousie won the senior game because they were the better team; they played together better, their back line was superior and they showed evidence of being in better condition in their excellent work at the finish. The Wanderers have a lot of good individuals, and with practice they should make a strong combination. The forwards were their mainstay in the game, but the team lacked one of the old timers to guide them at critical moments. The game ended in a 11 to 0 in Dalhousie's favor the same score exactly as made by St. Dunstan's in their triumph over the Abegweits on Thanksgiving Day.

Alfred Rogers won the Halifax Herald's ten mile road race Monday in 57.44, with Jimmy Martin only four seconds behind. It was a great contest between these two veteran runners.

They ran side by side for almost the entire ten miles, until the final spurt at the Wanderers' Grounds, where thousands witnessed a splendid finish, Alfred Rogers winning by four and one half seconds.

Both have been running for nearly a score of years, and Rogers had been second three times in these races before. Arthur Harrison, a most promising runner, was third, 11 min, 41 seconds behind the winner.
