THE S. S. SABLE.—The steamer Sable arrived in port at 4 o'clock on Saturday afternoon with a full cargo of goods. She sailed about 2 p. m., on Sunday taking about two thousand bushels of oats, 16 cattle, and nine horses. The steamer was discharged and loaded by the employees of Carvell Bros., agents here for the steamer.

WAS BURIED FOR AN HOUR.—Mr. Thomas Donovan, City, has received word from England telling that his son, Pte. Samuel Donovan, is in hospital recovering from injuries received at the front. Private Donovan was buried for an hour or so as the result of a shell explosion. He crossed to France with the first draft of the 105th Battalion.

COULD NOT ACCEPT.—Pictou correspondence, New Glasgow Evening News:—Rev. G. W. Thompson was up to Truro and Elmsdale this week assisting in Missionary meetings. Last night he attended a by-terry meeting and induction service at Eureka, and as interim moderator for the Cariboo and Cape John congregation, pressed their call to Rev. George Cameron of Charlottetown. Mr. Cameron graduated last year, but owing to the illness of his mother, who passed away during the year, was not able to take a charge. He is spoken of as a young man of a good deal of promise.

PLACING THE BUOYS.—The C. G. S. Stanley left Saturday morning with the buoys for the western shore of the Island.

NOTWITHSTANDING THE STRIKE.—The schooner Kate, with a cargo of lumber for L. M. Poole and Co., was discharged on Friday. The work was done by two union men and one non-union man. The vessel sailed on Saturday.

WEDDED IN TRENTON.—On Thursday, May 10th Mr. Horace L. Stewart of Prince Edward Island and Miss Nellie Johnson of Halifax were married at the Manse, Trenton, N. S. by Rev. A. A. MacLeod. Mr. Stewart lives in Trenton where he has been employed in the Steel Works for some time.

A MOTOR TRUCK.—Messrs. Le Page and Woolner, of Rusticville, have returned from St. John, N. B., where they purchased a thirty-five horse power motor truck for the carriage of fish and other products between Rusticville and Hunter River. This is the first venture of the kind in P. E. Island and it is hoped that success will reward the promoters for their enterprise.

CONVALESCING.—Mr. James Jenkins, Webster's Corner, has received the following kind letter from the R. C. Chaplain, Father P. B. Brookfield:—"Your friend F. A. Hopkinson has asked me to send you a line to say that he is getting very much better, and that he is grateful for the enquiries you have made about him. He has been badly wounded but since he has been at this No. 6 Casualty Clearing Station he has improved rapidly. He is very cheerful and often talks to me of this home and his friends."

EGG CIRCLE MEETING.—A meeting of the Southern King Egg Circle was held at Murray Harbor, Tuesday the 15th inst for the purpose of settling up the business of the past year and making arrangements for the present season. A goodly number attended the meeting and after the business was explained by the directors, the constitution read and adopted, and membership applications signed by the members present. Much appreciation was expressed for the satisfactory and profitable manner in which the business had been conducted both by the Central Association and the local circle officials. Previous to the meeting some dissatisfaction had been evidenced in regard to the percentage system of payment, but when the matter was explained, unanimous approval was expressed. A vote of thanks and appreciation was extended to the central association staff for their faithful and efficient service, special mention being made of Mr. Kerr and Mr. Lightizer. Optimistic addresses were given by Messrs. C. E. Sencabaugh, E. G. Gidding, F. C. Le Lacheur, A. B. McNeil, E. J. Lumsden and others. Owing to the satisfactory results of last year's work and the sound financial basis upon which the business is now established, the prospects for the future success of the co-operative selling of eggs and poultry seems to be assured. This success will not only bring profit to the producer but also to the consumer and credit to the province.

INSTITUTE MEETING.—The regular monthly meeting of the Cornwall-York Women's Institute was held in Cornwall Hall on the evening of Saturday May 12th. There was a large attendance of members and visitors, including Mr. Kerr, Maritime Poultry Representative, and the manager, directors, and patrons of the Cornwall Egg Circle. The secretary gave a report of the money collected and the work done by the Institute since Oct. 1916. In November a collection of \$50. was made, \$40. of which was spent for yarn; in March a social was held and \$30 raised which was also spent for yarn. 142 pairs of socks have been knit by the members and enough yarn remains on hand to keep them busy for some time. Recently the sum of \$135 was collected all of which has been donated to the Red Cross Fund. After the business of the Institute had been transacted Mr. Kerr addressed the meeting. He explained the purpose of the Egg Circles and told how they have so improved the quality of the eggs that a name has been created for the Association that is Dominion wide. This is proven by the large orders for circle eggs that are pouring in from every market. Other matters explained were the Capital Fund and the percentage advance. When the business for 1916 was settled it was found that though the members had received for their eggs a price equal to that paid by the dealers, there remained a balance of almost \$20,000. This is to be divided among the members so each one will receive an additional amount of 2½ cents per doz. for all eggs supplied to the Association in 1916. The Association does not buy eggs from the members. It markets them for the members, advancing a percentage of the price at the time the eggs are received. Settlements will be made at the end of the year when nothing will be withheld but the amount of the Capital Fund which will constitute the reserve fund for next year. Refresh-

FAMOUS WOMAN SWIMMER BEGAN LIFE AS A CRIPPLE.

In the American Magazine for March appeared a story by Annette Kellermann, in which this woman-athlete declares she began life as a cripple in iron leg braces, and was cured of her deformity by acquiring the art of swimming, of which she subsequently became the champion.

The story was questioned by many as a press agent invention, and several admirers of her swimming and diving feats in "A Daughter of the Gods" took the trouble to write to her about it.

"It is true, every word of it," replied Miss Kellermann. "I personally gave the story to the American Magazine through their contributor, Henry Irving Dodge. So there should be no mistake in the historical details. Mr. Dodge brought a stenographer, who took down my statement, and later he showed me the completed article, which I revised."

While Miss Kellermann was thus confirming the story, another and striking outside confirmation of it arrived in a letter to William Fox, of the Fox Film Corporation from Garnet Warren the Australian author and artist, who is now living in Chicago.

"I saw the article in the American and wish to substantiate it in its entirety," wrote Mr. Warren. "It is literally the truth that is so often stronger than fiction. Our family and Miss Kellermann's mother lived within a block of each other in Sydney, New South Wales. She was Mme. Carbon-
