### EDITORIAL NOTES.

The St. John San of April 26th says:—In the Senate Mr. Ferguson and Sir Mackenzie are making things a little lively for the Minister of Justice, who with Mr. Scott is obliged to defend all the actions of the government. The plebiscite has caused Mr. Mills some worry, and the Secretary of State has been trying to explain away the failure of mail communication with Prince Edward Island.

Oliver Cromwell was born 300 years ago, on April 25th, 1599. There is this year a wide celebration of the tri-centennial of this masterful statesman. He had certain qualities of greatness, marred by great faults. Cromwell was a man of "blood and iron" and no one can deny that the few years during which he ruled were great years in English history. The Northumberland Straits from West Point to Carlton Head, P. E. I., and the opposite New Brunswick shore, from May 25th to August 10th.

Around Prince Edward Island, except as above mentioned, and shore of Liverpool Co., C. B., and on N. B., and Quebec shores north of Shockpish River, (New Brunswick) April 20th to July 10th.

### LIFTS A \$200 RING

### Absconds With \$750 and a Good-Looking Young Woman.

HAMILTON, Ont., April 25.—W. F. Mitchell, district representative of the Goold Bicycle company, of Brantford, with headquarters at Hamilton, is missing and the police have in their possession a warrant charging him with stealing a large sum of money estimated at \$700.

A young lady with whom he had been keeping company is also missing. In spite of the fact that he is understood to be married, and it is surmised that she has gone with Mitchell. Mitchell left a number of victims besides, the Goold Company, among them the proprietor of the Waldorf hotel, where he boarded. He was formerly manager for the Goold Company. Mitchell was well known in Charlottetown having visited this city a number of times.

LATER.

It appears the Goold people had become much dissatisfied with the way Mitchell conducted himself here, and General Manager Lashley came to Hamilton Saturday and discharged Mitchell. The office keys were to be handed over today, and between Saturday night and this morning, the office was entered and the safe rifled of all cash and cheques. As Mitchell was the only one who had necessary keys and knew the combination he is charged with the theft. Mitchell is known as a high flyer and frequently gave champagne suppers. He is said to have a wife in St. John. N. B., but posed as a bachelor here and has been popular with the fair sex.

Among Mitchell's many dupes is Dr. Fred Roseburgh, who parted with a diamond ring valued at \$225. He sold it to Mitchell on Saturday and received a check for \$200 in payment, only to learn from the bank people today that there were no funds.
